Prisoners of War and Men Return From Job of Conquering Germany

Milton soldiers are coming back from overseas in increasing numbers these days and families and friends are indeed pleased to welcome their safe return and grand re-union.

Dvr. Bob Clarke, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Clarke came home on Thursday. In the army since September 1941 he has spent two years on the Pacific coast and been overseas since November 1944. He has been serving in Holland and Germany. Pte. Clarke came back on the Queen Mary and reports a splendid crossing. Before enlisting he attended Westdale Collegiate in Hamilton. Parents and sister are joined by other friends in welcoming him home again.

Prisoner of War for five months, Cpl. F. V. Cannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Cannon arrived home in Milton on Thursday. He has been in the army five years and after training in Canada spent two years in Jamaica and two years in Europe. He was with the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada. Before enlisting Cpl. Cannon was employed with the Milton District Co-operative. Friends join with the parents and brothers, Clifford, Ray and John and sisters, Mrs. J. Cooper and Olive in welcoming him back.

Pte. Joe Mark of the 5th Armoured Brigade, R.C.A.S.C. was another to come home on the Queen Mary and arrive back in Milton on Thursday. Pte. Mark has been in the Canadian Army for five years and three months and overseas for three years and 10 months. He served in England, Sicily, Holland, Belgium and Germany. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Mark. Before enlisting he was working on the farm. Friends join with parents in rejoicing in his safe return.

Sgt. Nelson Lott, R.C.A.S.C., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Lott arrived home last week. He has been serving overseas since June 1940. After his leave he expects to be going to the Pacific.

After spending a few months overseas F./S. Ken Gullis R.C.A.F., arrived home on leave this week before training for service in the Pacific. All are indeed glad to welcome these Milton men back home.

Missing twice, the last time for 10 months in Germany, F./O. Ken Galloway made his second trip home to Canada and arrived in Milton on Tuesday. Reported missing in July 1944, he was in May of this year reported safe in England. A year previous he was reported missing in Burma and was home on leave for Christmas 1943. He came back to Canada this time on the Ile de France and family and friends are rejoicing indeed in his safe return.

Sgt. C. B. Wall, whose mother, Mrs. Arthur Smith resides at Speyside was another from this district aboard the Ile de France returning to Canada. He will go to the Pacific after a leave at home.

The Milton Council met on Tuesday evening. Councillors J. W. Higgins, G. C. Gowland, J. A. Rush, C. G. Riddell and Reeve C. H. Heslop were present and Mayor Geo. H. Dawson presided.

A letter of thanks was received for the letter of condolence to the family of R. B. Galbraith on the death of a son as sent by the Council.

A letter from G. E. Elliott requested permission to hold a tag day for the Blind in September. A tentative date was set.

A letter from the Secretary of the Lorne Scots Band thanked Council for the donation given the band in connection with the V-E Day celebrations.

The Committees recommended the following accounts be passed: Fire, Light and Police \$ 97.65 Printing and Contingencies 119.33 Creditors re D. Somers estate 106.87 Town Hall and Property 17.39 Waterworks Committee 128.20 Streets and Walks 127.23

The Finance Committee passed the above accounts for payment and others totalling \$1,006.50.

The matter of procuring certificates for the returning service personnel was gone into and it was decided to order 300 of these certificates.

A request for a band instrument owned by the Corporation was made to Council. Council refused the request.

Signs were ordered to be placed in front of the theatre prohibiting parking and the law was to be enforced.

The estimates for the year was gone over with Treasurer Sproat and compared with the amount spent as to date.

Councillor Riddell reported that an engineer would be in Milton during July and would give an estimate on repairing Main Street and laying certain sidewalks as are needed.

A tender from the Hamilton Roofing and Insulating Company for re-roofing the Town Hall was read. The Alexander, Murray and Co., of Toronto also submitted a price for the Town Hall roofing job.

Council discussed the matter fully and left details to be procured by the Committee in charge for further consideration by the Council.

THIS WEEK

TORONTO (CP)—Ontario's 22nd Legislature, opening a special session Monday, after re-electing W. J. Stewart, Progressive Conservative member for Toronto Parkdale as Speaker, and listening to the shortest throne speech on record, took up where the old House left off last March.

Reintroducing his 1945 budget, which had not been passed at the session of the house previous to the general election, Provincial Treasurer Leslie Frost declared that since April 1 government business had been carried on to the extent of \$14,400,000 by lieutenant-governor's warrants. Mr. Frost explained that in financing by this method, which was without precedent in Ontario, the government had been "scrupulously careful to confine its expenditures to those which could be classed as urgently and immediately required for the public good."

The treasurer reported a "slight improvement" in the province's financial position over that forecast last March when a surplus of \$114,000 was predicted for the fiscal year ending on March 31, 1946.

Agriculture Minister T. L. Kennedy introduced bills renewing cheese, hog and sugar beet subsidies for 1945, while a bill authorizing municipalities to invest in housing and other civic projects in outside municipalities was brought in by Provincial Secretary George Dunbar.

A bill amending the Ontario School Law was introduced at this mid-session by Premier Drew. Provisions of the new bill would lower minimum employment requirements for teachers' and school inspectors' salaries and raise maximum pensions from \$1,000 to \$1,500. A minimum pension, based on average salary is also proposed in the bill. An amendment to the Adolescent School Attendance Act would permit the minister of education to make regulations providing for the issuing of home permits and employment certificates.

Farquhar Oliver, 41-year-old Pricerville farmer is the new Liberal House Leader. He was elected to succeed Mitchell F. Hepburn at a caucus of the 11 Liberal members of the legislature held July 4. W. J. Grummett of Sault Ste. Marie, member for Cochrane South, will lead the eight-man C.C.F. representation in the House. He succeeds E. R. Jolliffe who was defeated in York South. The name of Garfield Anderson, mayor of Fort William had been prominently mentioned in this connection, but he will act as deputy House Leader.

Two-day hearing of argument by counsel before the Lebel Royal Commission inquiring into charges by C.C.F. leader E. B. Jolliffe that the Drew government operated a "secret political police" was scheduled to begin Wednesday.

Taking of evidence was completed last week after 15 days of sessions in which 36 witnesses were heard. Mr. Jolliffe, first witness in the probe, occasioned by his May 24 broadcast allegations that overshadowed all other issues in the recent Ontario election campaign, was also the last to testify.

Fire which broke out in freight sheds at Point Edward, near Sarnia, destroyed the Great Lakes passenger steamer Hamonic, Tuesday, and sent 247 passengers, mostly Americans, and crew members scrambling for safety. Early reports stated that "possibly 200 persons" were treated in hospital for burns or shock, but there was no loss of life. Unofficial local estimates soon after the fire placed the overall damage at about \$1,000,000.

The steamer, veteran of at least 33 years of Great Lakes service, is owned by the Northern Navigation Company. Freight sheds were levelled and several freight cars gutted.

Milton Airman On Crew That Attacked Sub.

One of the Last Actions Before Subs Surrendered Made Off Irish Coast

A Nazi submarine sneaked into the Irish Sea just before VE day, it can now be revealed, and was threatening Allied shipping in those waters when it was discovered and attacked by a R.C.A.F. Sunderland flying boat crew led by P/L A. R. Pinder, Goderich.

This was the third U-boat to be sighted and attacked by F/L Pinder since he came overseas to join the Coastal Command. It was also one of the very last attacks to be made before Admiral Karl Doenitz issued the historic order for all German submarines to surface and surrender.

One of the latest types to be sent into action by the Nazi just before their final capitulation, the enemy sub was fitted with the "Schorkel" breathing device. This equipment, one of the German Navy's most secret inventions, made it possible for the U-boat to recharge batteries and obtain fresh air without surfacing.

First to spot the Nazi target was W.O. 1 T. Roach, West Newton, Mass., air gunner on duty in the flying boat's rear gun turret.

Unopposed by anti-aircraft fire, since the enemy target was almost fully submerged, F.L. Pinder took the Sunderland down to a very low level and depth charges were not released until the flying boat was above the U-boat's conning tower. The R.C.A.F. front gunner, as the aircraft made its run in, fired 50 rounds with unobserved results.

The U-boat disappeared immediately after the depth charges exploded. No further trace of it was seen although five Allied corvettes and frigates arrived to join in the hunt and F.L. Pinder kept circling the attack area for several hours before returning to his base in Northern Ireland.

F/O. R. W. Merkle, of Milton was one of the crew who flew with F.L. Pinder to score this coastal command attack.
