THIS WEEK

TORONTO (CP)—Just when Canadians were tightening their belts to take in the slack brought about by renewed meat rationing across the Dominion, the executive of the Ontario Beef Cattle Producers' Association issued a statement announcing not only that it opposed rationing, but that it felt "grave concern over the probability of glutted cattle markets in Canada—particularly during the fall months."

Meeting in Toronto, the association recommended that the federal government see to it that all slaughtering facilities be utilized to capacity; that cattle not sold after 72 hours on the public markets be exported where export permits were requested; that slaughter houses be allowed to kill all animals for which they could find a market.

Expressing its opposition to meat rationing, the association said it will ask other provincial beef producer associations to seek to enlist the support of their respective agriculture ministers in having rationing abolished. The Ontario group held a conference with Agriculture Minister Kennedy, but no statement was forthcoming following the meeting.

A Markdale, Ont., lawyer has developed a 1,000-tree fruit orchard in his half-acre back yard. Secret of Isaac Luca's big little orchard is "dwarfing" fruit trees by repressive pruning, or curbing the tips of vigorous branches, tying them down to other branches and confining the roots in the initial stages of growth.

For the past 12 years, Mr. Lucas has been developing his freak orchard and producing apples, pears, cherries, plums and peaches in his little patch of back yard. He has succeeded in dwarfing apple trees to as small as three feet across the densest part of the foliage silhouette.

Canada had a national public holiday to mark Japan's defeat, and communities across the Dominion also proclaimed civic holidays. Prime Minister King announced that an appropriate Sunday would be designated as a day of national thanksgiving.

And speaking of celebrations, down in London, Ont., they had a Christmas in August.

F.O. Frank Ayers was overseas last Christmas and his family missed his presence at the holiday so much that they decided to hold Christmas off until the young airman got back from the wars.

And so it was that, despite calendars, tradition and sweltering weather F.O. Ayers had his Christmas this week, complete with chicken dinner, cake, decorated tree—and even Santa Claus!
