County Council Studies County Assessor Plan

does. The county assessor is also personally instructed by the Department in the work that is required of him and this information is in turn passed on by him to the local assessors. Assessment on farm lands is made between April 30 and September 30, which you will agree is the logical time at which such assessment should be made.

Reeve Hillmer, Oakville, stated his approval of the assessment plan as outlined by Mr. Coombes.

Reeve Hillmer, Oakville, stated his council was absolutely opposed to any such scheme. Esquing council is also opposed to the plan.

Mr. Coombes: "I know there has been and will be a certain amount of opposition, but it can generally be broken down by showing what has been done. It may be that Oakville is afraid of paying more than its share."

Reeve Robertson said Nelson had always been in favor of a county assessor.

Reeve Gilbert said Trafalgar was also in favor but they did not want to go in if there were others staying out.

Mr. Coombes: "Isn't it possible that those who are opposed know very little of what it is all about? If, despite this opposition, the county as a whole is desirous of appointing an assessor then a vote should be taken, the yeas and nays recorded and action taken according to the vote."

Reeve J. M. McDonald thanked Mr. Coombes for his instructive and lucid address which was further corroborated by the Warden.

In Committee of the Whole Reeve J. M. McDonald occupied the chair. There was very little business arising from the reports. Accounts passed were as follows:

Finance, \$824.20; Hospitals, \$601.80; School Health Service, \$372.19; Printing, \$43.16; County Buildings, \$301; County Roads, \$16,075.12.

Communications: Board of Transport re communication from County Council regarding new station at Guelph Junction. The Board stated that no application had been received from the C. P. R. regarding the construction of a new station at Guelph Junction but if such were decided upon the council would be informed. The Board also asked that it be informed specifically of any dangerous condition at Guelph Junction and if necessary would instruct members of the board to view the same and report thereon, in which case representatives of the council would be given an opportunity to be present.

A communication from the Garage Operators' Association petitioned the Council to take some action to have a nightly patrol through rural areas at night because of the increasing number of break-ins at country garages.

Council agreed that some action was necessary and instructed the clerk to write to the Department of Justice and ask that some assistance be given the County Police so that a nightly patrol might be inaugurated. Council adjourned to meet Tuesday, October 9.

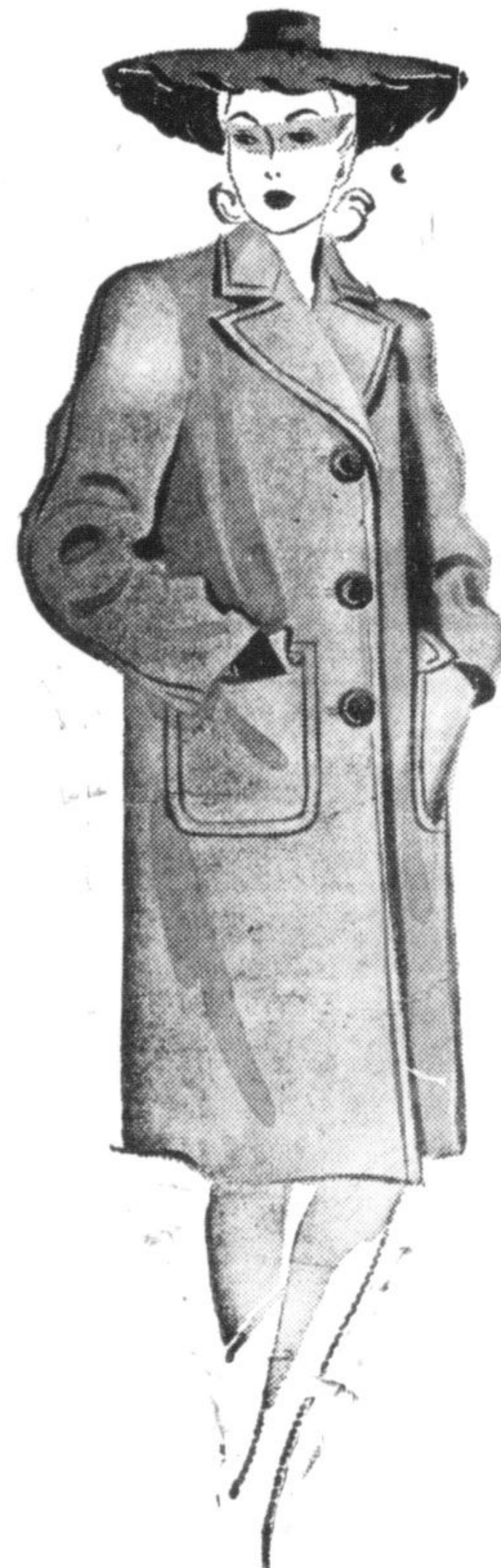
