**THE HALTON CROP ASSOCIATION TO STAGE PASTURE TOUR**

"Long Term" or "Permanent Pastures" as they are sometimes incorrectly named, have been the subject of keen interest among Ontario farmers the past two or three years. Demonstration fields and plots have been laid down in the majority of Ontario counties by the Ontario Department of Agriculture in co-operation with the respective County Crop Improvement Association in both 1944 and 1945. In order to provide an opportunity for Halton farmers to see for themselves and secure first hand information, the Halton Crop Improvement Association has arranged a tour to some seven different Halton farms recently learned from A. T. Woodley, President of the Halton Association. The date selected is Thursday, September 20th, and the various points to be visited are outlined elsewhere in this issue.

N. J. Thomas, Pasture Specialist at the O.A.C. is scheduled to accompany the tour. For further information, those interested should contact either Mr. Woodley, or Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock.

**THIS WEEK**

TORONTO, Sept. 11 (CP)—In the first series of weekly press conferences designed to facilitate open discussion of government affairs, Premier George Drew announced that cabinet appointments planned by the Ontario government will not be made until the legislature convenes this fall for a special meeting.

The premier said it was planned to hold the session after the Dominion-provincial conference at Ottawa in November, but it might be necessary to hold the session before the completion of the conference if developments warranted such action. Dr. R. P. Vivian, health minister, would not resign to accept a McGill University appointment until after the special session.

Mr. Drew said there will be a department of veterans' affairs and a department of travel and recreation in the cabinet. There would be no lapse in the operation of the Ontario Labor Code even if the federal government discontinues its code.

Quadruplets—two boys and two girls were born to Mr. and Mrs. Hugh A. Smith, of Caistor, Ont. One of the little girls died shortly after birth but the other three stood a fairly good chance of survival. Mr. and Mrs. Smith have three other children and there are no previous multiple births in either of their families that either of the parents can recall.

The Ontario fall assizes opened this week with the largest number of major criminal cases to come before the Supreme Court in years—representing what Attorney-General C. L. Snyder termed "a disturbing increase in crimes of violence." The list includes 18 murder cases, one attempted murder, 25 manslaughter cases and 18 cases of rape and attempted rape.

In addition to the major crime cases to be heard, Mr. Snyder said "reports indicate a marked increase in other crimes—particularly armed robbery, shoplifting and theft."
