Release To Public Surplus Equipment

Blankets, Hardware, Brooms are Sold by British Services

LONDON (CP)—Plans are being completed for the release to the public of vast quantities of surplus service equipment, including hundreds of thousands of blankets and hardware and holloware of all kinds.

The most important ranges of domestic goods are to be released to the retail trades through disposal corporations now being set up by the board of trade. Blankets, sheets and domestic linen probably will be dealt with by a surplus textile corporation now in existence.

Prices now are being worked out but they will not exceed the pre-war price of comparable new materials.

Some ranges of goods, such as brooms and brushes, will be bought by the trade under a plan of restricted tender and firms normally engaged in the distribution of such products will get the business. Disposal centres will be established throughout the United Kingdom at which trades will be able to see the goods.
