Carnauba Palm a Valuable Wax

From the semi-arid northeastern area of Brazil come the world's entire supply of the world's most valuable wax, the product of the Carnauba palm tree. The uses of Carnauba wax are many. It goes into picric acid for gunpowder, lipstick, sealing material for dry cell batteries, and is used in the manufacture of floor, shoe and furniture polishes, gramophone records, sound film, electric insulators, soap candles, lubricating oil and carbon paper. The wax is also used for waterproofing paper, cardboard textiles, and industrial machinery, and in the manufacture of various salves and ointments, artificial fruit, plaster matches, cable coverings, paints, and varnishes. A coating of the wax enables aeroplanes to increase their speed. Because carnauba has been used for three times the viscosity of beeswax, it is used to harden beeswax, cerasin, and paraffin.

The value of the carnauba palm, however, is not limited to wax. The trunk provides rural housing materials, furniture, pilings, fences, bridges and fuel for industrial use. The bark is used for home fuel. From the leaves are made baskets, thatch roofs, hats, ropes, mats and other woven products. The sap provides a wholesome tapioca, and a fermented drink. Young shoots are used as palmito cabbage and the heart of the young palm makes a starch, similar to manioc (cassava) flour. From the pitch comes a coffee-like drink. Stalks and other residue provide cattle fodder.

The wax comes from the serried, fan-like leaves, radiating from the crown of the tree. Giving the appearance of a coating of dust, the wax forms during the dry season, preventing excessive evaporation from the tree. Drought increases the yield of wax, but severe drought over a period of years may kill the tree. Young trees begin to produce wax after eight or ten years.

MIDLAND, ONT., (CP)—A letter home accidentally dropped by a Canadian soldier, prompted an 18-year old Dutch boy to start up a correspondence with the addressee.

The soldier was Spr. Walter Brown, now stationed in Utrecht, Holland and it was his wife in Midland who received the note.

The Dutch boy told of picking up the letter and deciding to write to the addressee in Canada.

"I hope you'll not call it intrusive," he wrote, "if I ask you to keep up correspondence with us in Holland. I especially wrote in order to practice my English knowledge because I'm at a Grammar school preparing for university."

Personality Factor In Feminine Appeal

Painter of Movie Stars Says Make-Up Not Necessarily Key to Success

NEW YORK (CP)—The next time you feel inclined to look like your favorite movie star, think twice before you copy her lips, the curve of her eyebrow or the color of her hair. Because it may not be any of these things that are responsible for her appeal.

You may find it is her personality that has contributed to the star's success, says Ladislav Segy, who has just completed a series of paintings of movie picture actresses to be shown at his next portrait exhibit.

If you must imitate a star, Mr. Segy advises discover the personality key of the one that is most like you. Then try to develop your personality along the same lines. With so many types in the movies this shouldn't be difficult. He explains:

"Your admiration may lean toward Katherine Hepburn, who has more of the cool calculating type of intellectual appeal. If you like independence you can be this type and attract an intellectual man."

To attract a man who likes to be dominated you've got to have a bit of Bacall in you. Lauren, says Segy, is the mysterious type of person who emphasizes her mystery in her walk, speech and general manner.

Garson Technique

But if you want the man to wear the pants, he says, you can appeal to the he-man with a little of the Greer Garson technique. This is the ultra-feminine type who must constantly be building a man's ego and must adjust herself to his whims without saying boo.

Hedy Lamarr is the beautiful type and one of Hollywood's exceptions. She is the decorative type of woman a man marries because he likes to see her admired by other people and because he likes her cool and composed attitude showing "intellectual control," says Segy, who adds:

"If you are nervous and sensitive, women like Bette Davis, you should appeal to the cultured type of sensitive man."

"But if you are cool and detached like Veronica Lake, whose passive personality flares up only under extreme pressure of circumstances, you will probably attract the cool reserved type of man."

Of course you may find yourself not in sympathy with any of these personalities. In that case, advises Segy, develop your own. And if you are the "naive" type don't underestimate yourself. There are many men, says Segy, who admire unspooled naive women and it is worth developing this charm.

CONVENTION BAN OFF NOVEMBER 1

The ban on conventions and other meetings, in effect for the last few months to turn over maximum hotel and travel facilities to troops in transport, is scheduled to be lifted November 1, according to an announcement made last week by Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

The Prices Board sees heavy travel falling off in November together with some slackening in the volume of troops returning home. The Board's announcement is made well ahead of time so that any groups planning conventions may have sufficient time to make full arrangements.
