Girl Spray Painter Surprises Her Boss

Regina Decorator Thought He Had Hired a Novice But Soon Changed His Mind

REGINA (CP)—Tom Hughes, Regina decorator, was pleased when selective service authorities told him they had a painter for him; saddened when they said the painter was a woman. But Mr. Hughes now is smiling—the girl has turned out to be one of the best painters on his staff.

She is Wylda Arnold of Regina, and her ability is understandable, for her father, W. J. Arnold and brother, Alfred are also painters.

When Miss Arnold began work here nothing much was expected of her, but when she covered 5,000 square feet in one day with a paint sprayer she convinced Mr. Hughes that she could hold her own with the men.

For two years she worked in Vancouver with an aircraft company spraying paint on planes. She liked Vancouver but didn't care for the work, and when the company began laying off employees she returned to Regina, asked selective service what kind of a job they had to offer. Officials grinned politely when she said she was a qualified spray painter.

Mr. Hughes needed help badly when selective service told him they had a woman painter, hired her thinking she would be useful in carrying paint here and there, mixing some of it and turning the compressor on and off.

Miss Arnold was taken to a job involving spraying some storage drums her first day on the Hughes staff. Her employer said she picked up a sprayer, seemed to know how it worked, so he left her and returned to Regina.

That day Wylda covered 5,000 square feet with paint, and Mr. Hughes said proudly, "that's high average for even a man." Top-flight male painters have been known to cover 7,000 square feet in a day.

Wylda likes the work but says little about it. She intends, though, to continue to paint as long as there is work for a woman painter to do.

HORMONE TESTS FOR SCRAWNY ROOSTERS

COLLEGE PARK, MD., (CP)—University of Maryland biologists are trying to fatten up scrawny roosters by feeding them the chemicals that give female chickens their curves. The results have just been so-so.

The scientists are giving the roosters synthetic drugs similar to the natural female hormone "estrogen," which produces the layer of fat beneath the skin.

In the past the natural hormone, has been employed to some extent, but its use was very limited because of its expense. Within the last few years, however, estrogen-like drugs have been manufactured and are now available in sufficient quantity to justify experimental use.

In the Maryland experiments, according to Assistant Professor E. W. Glazener, treated roosters have undergone a kind of temporary femininity. Their combs and wattles grow pale and shrivel up. But these effects pass when the chemical diet stops.

A few roosters picked up a little flesh, but others remained as skinny as ever. Glazener says a lot more must be learned about dosage and length of treatment before the practice can be recommended to poultrymen.

"Meanwhile," he says, "although it appears that poultry receiving drug treatments is safe for human consumption, these drugs are extremely potent and should remain in experimental channels."
