Hello Homemakers! Once again it is time to replace screens and awnings with storm windows and to clean and arrange our homes for winter living. Housecleaning may cause a burst of energy on the part of the homemaker, but it will be greeted with wrath by the other members of the family if everything is turned inside out at once.

It is wise to clean only one room at a time. Begin by the walls, then do the floor and windows and finally the furnishings. To remove wax from polished floors use vinegar in warm water or a standard cleaning fluid. To clean rugs and upholstery use a vacuum cleaner and suitable attachments.

When cleaning bookcases and magazine racks do not forget to sort out the more recent contents for the Navy League. Do not overlook the pictures, lighting fixtures and knick-knacks. Now you are ready to rearrange the furniture and hang the fresh curtains.

RECIPES TO SUBSTITUTE FOR RICE

½ cup pearl barley, 4 cups milk, ¼ cup corn syrup, ¼ cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, nutmeg.

Wash barley and soak it for one hour. Drain and put into well greased pudding dish. Heat milk and add to it syrup, sugar and salt. Pour over barley. Dust with nutmeg and bake in electric oven 275 degs. for 3 hours, stirring every half hour and adding vanilla at the last stirring. Serve with cream or boiled custard.

SUET PUDDING

1 cup suet (chopped fine), 1 cup molasses, 1 cup bread crumbs ½ cup sour milk, 1½ cups flour,

¼ tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp allspice ¼ tsp. cloves, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup prunes or stewed fruit, grated rind ½ lemon.

Mix and sift dry ingredients and combine with other ingredients. Turn into well-greased pudding dish, having the dish no more than ¾ full. Cover closely with greased paper. Place in steamer and steam 3 hours. Serve with lemon or any pudding sauce, using corn syrup instead of sugar.

MACARONI PUDDING

1 cupful macaroni, 1 tsp. salt, ½ cup corn syrup, ¼ cup brown sugar, 2 eggs lightly beaten, 2 cups milk, 1tsp. vanilla, nutmeg 1tsp. butter.

Add macaroni to pot of rapidly boiling salted water, and cook until tender. Drain. Four into buttered pudding dish. Add the well-beaten eggs to the milk and vanilla. Pour over the macaroni. Dust with nutmeg or cinnamon. Dot with the butter. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven until custard is set and top a golden brown. Serve with top of milk or cream.

OLD TIME APPLE PUDDING

Pare four large, sour apples, core and chop fine with chopping knife in chopping bowl. Mix 4 ounces (about a cup) of stale bread crumbs with 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon and a half of one grated nutmeg, and mix with the apples. Beat the yolks of 4 eggs and add to the mixture. Stir in the whites carefully, until the whole is moist enough to hold together, then steam for 2 hours in a well-greased mould. Serve hot with a foamy sauce, which should supply enough sweetening, unless apples are excessively sour.

LONDON (CP)—Snow camouflage suits worn by British soldiers in Europe were made weeks before D-Day by an army of women machinists. To make certain of replacements, thousands of yards of the heavy white cotton have been sent to be made up by A.T.S. girls serving in the European theatre.

CIVILIANS PURCHASE NAVY'S LITTLE SHIPS

LONDON (CP)—The admiralty already has received 7,000 letters regarding purchase of the navy's "little ships" and the first 50 coastal craft are to be made available for civilian purchase.

"We shall take the highest offer for each boat," an Admiralty official said. "The guns and engines will be removed and most of the boats will need a good deal of adaption.

"Coastal forces craft are between 63 and 70 feet long, with good cabin accommodation and sleeping room for five persons.

"Many of the letters we have received from people who have hardly ever been in a ship before in their lives. They want to convert the ships themselves and the idea of adventure seems strong among them."

The admiralty plans to release a few dozen ships a week for civilian purchase and release of invasion landing craft and barges will take longer. Dealing is direct to the public and not through private firms.

"Hundreds" of inquiries for invasion craft have been made. Steel barges are expected to sell for about £1,000 and wooden barges for about £700.

Garden Clean-up Will Destroy Insects

Most insects hibernate out-of-doors in one stage of development or another. In the Canadian climate, protection of some sort is essential to enable them to survive the sub-zero temperatures. In some cases this protection is provided by the insects themselves and takes the form of thicker cocoons, impervious coverings to egg-masses, woolly coats (on caterpillars) and so on, says Alan G. Duestan, Division of Entomology, Dominion Department of Agriculture.

In many instances, however, the insects must rely on insulating materials quite apart from their own bodies, and probably the most commonly used is plant refuse, such as coverings of dead leaves, masses of withered grass near the ground surface, hollow stems of plants or piles of refuse found in or nearby cultivated fields or gardens. When winter approaches, insects seek cover beneath these as a protection from the cold. Some species are far-sighted enough to lay their eggs or spin up their cocoons on garden plants, depending on these to provide suitable cover when they wilt and die down in the autumn.

The careful gardener takes advantage of this habit on the part of insects to reduce their numbers and limit the insects which will emerge the following spring. By raking up and burning all dead leaves, old grass withered plants and other sources of shelter a large percentage of insects hibernating in the garden will be at once destroyed or will die of exposure during the autumn, winter or early spring months. Burning over grassland and weedy areas adjacent to the garden will also kill many eggs, cocoons, hibernating caterpillars and some adult forms, such as butterflies and beetles. All of which will be found helpful. If this practice is neglected, a large proportion of the insects which inhabit the garden in the fall will pass through the winter successfully to emerge in the spring to seriously damage the new crops when they are breaking through the soil. Garden sanitation is one of the most important steps in insect control and will pay large dividends if carefully carried out.

CHARLOTTETOWN (CP)—Modifying a previous stand, Prince Edward Island doctors have decided to issue six-month liquor prescriptions according to their "conscience and practice." At the same time, they urged the provincial government to introduce government sale of liquor to remove the onus of issuing prescriptions from them.

PUBLIC MEETING TO BE HELD

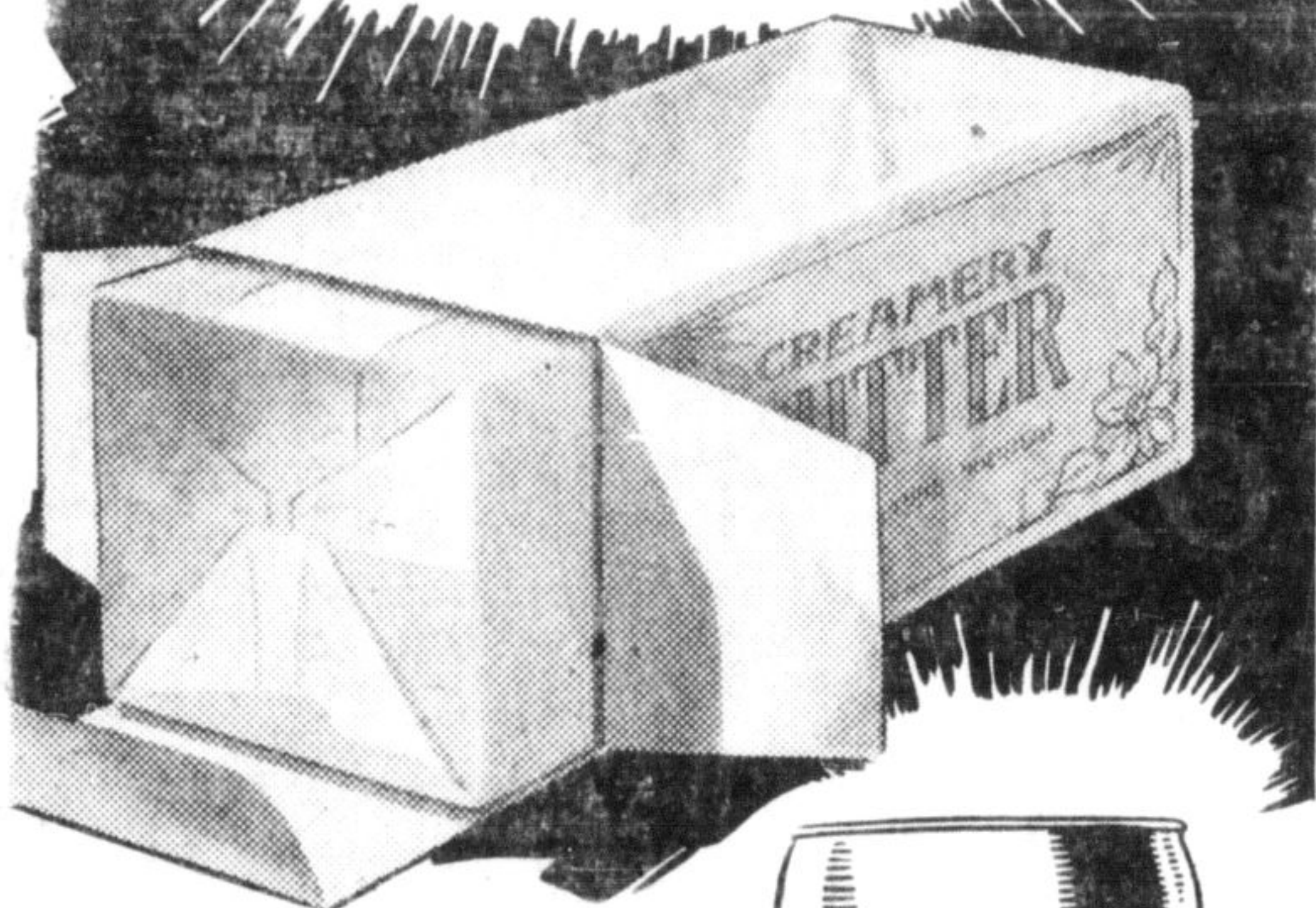


A PUBLIC MEETING Will be held at Princess Theatre, Milton — at 8 p.m. Thurs., November 15th

All ballots must be returned to the Agricultural Representative before December 8, 1945. -- Any Ballots received after that date will not be recorded.

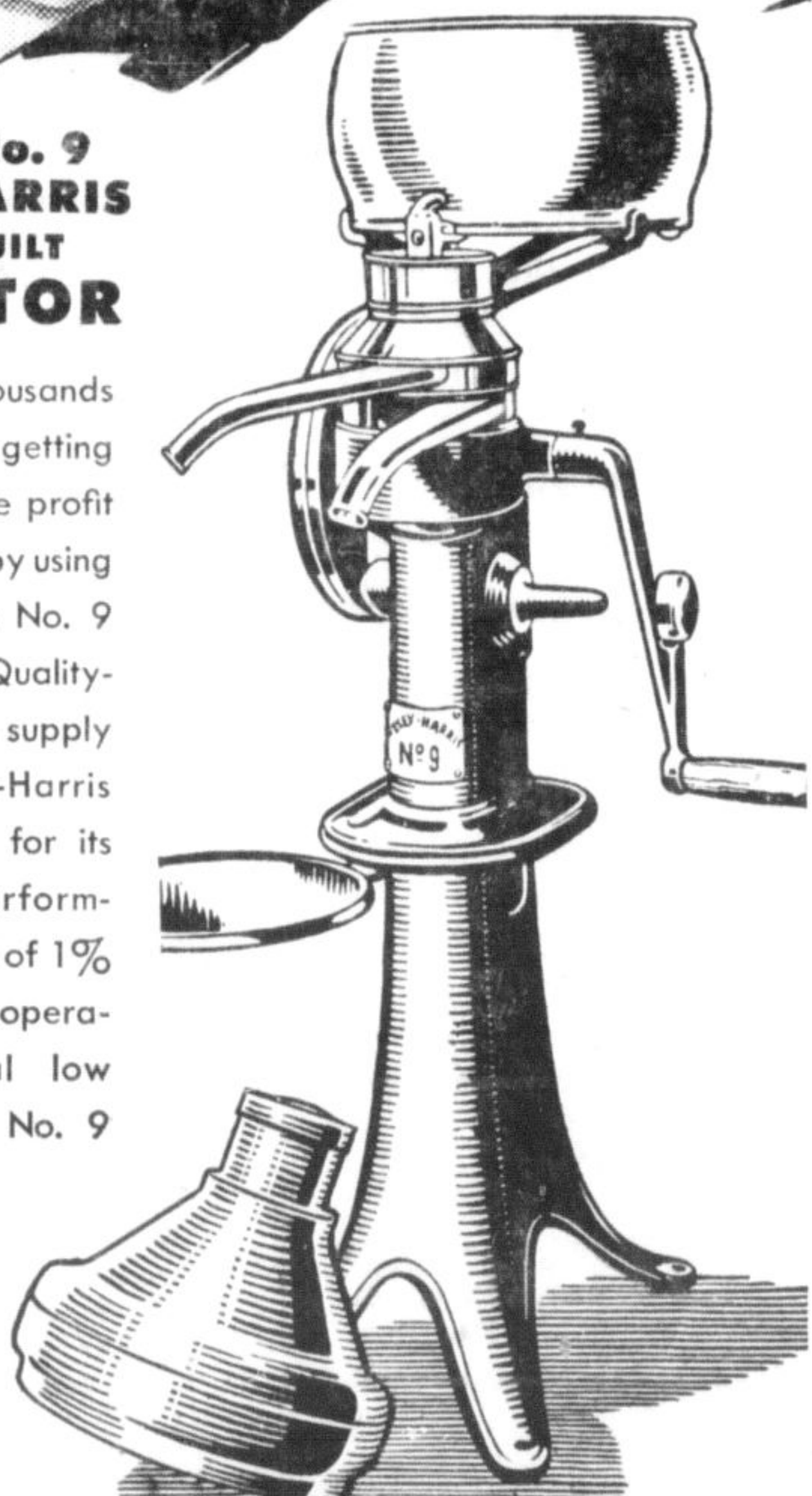
