AUSSIES FIGHT SOIL EROSION

CANBERRA (CP) — Australia has suffered much from erosion, both by wind and water, in recent years. Water erosion has gullied vast areas, especially in New South Wales, and the wind storms have blown a good deal of the continent into the sea.

The first large-scale test of contour conservation has been started at Gul-gong in New South Wales, in the heart of the erosion area. It includes the making of seven miles of gressed waterways, the contour banking of 850 acres and the pasture furrowing of 800 acres.

Gratuities Explained By Rehabilitation Local Committee

A system of war service gratuities was established by the enactment of the War Service Grants Act, 1944. The Act provides for a war service gratuity and, subject to certain exceptions and conditions, make available also a re-establishment credit. Those eligible are ex-service personnel who have served on active service in this war either without territorial limitations, or in the Aleutian Islands, and who have been honorably discharged. The amount of the gratuity and credit is based on the period of such service and there is an additional grant for those who have served overseas. In computing the length of service, periods of leave of absence without pay, absence without leave, penal servitude, imprisonment or detention, and periods when pay is forfeited are not included.

The war service gratuity consist of a basic gratuity payable to everyone and a supplementary gratuity payable to those who have had overseas service.

(a) The basic gratuity is calculated as follows: \$7.50 for each 30 days of service in the Western Hemisphere while enlisted or obligated to serve without territorial limitations; \$15.00 for each 30 days of service overseas or in the Aleutian Islands. These rates are applicable to all ranks.

(b) The supplementary gratuity is 7 days pay and allowances for every six months service overseas or in the Aleutian Islands or proportionately when the service includes periods of less than 6 months. Pay and allowances includes all pay and allowances which were being paid immediately prior to discharge, and in any event includes lodging and provision allowance in case of a member of the Naval Forces and subsistence allowance in the case of a member of the Military or Air Forces at standard rates payable in Canada.

"Overseas Service" is defined in the Act as follows: "Any service involving duties required to be performed outside of the Western Hemisphere and including service involving duties required to be performed outside of Canada and the United States of America and the territorial waters thereof in aircraft, or anywhere in sea-going ships of war."

"The Western Hemisphere" is defined in the Act as follows: "The continents of North and South America, the islands adjacent thereto and the territorial waters thereof including Newfoundland, Bermuda and the West Indies but excluding Greenland, Iceland and the Aleutian Islands."

The gratuity will be paid in monthly instalments starting a month after a man's discharge. Under this plan he will receive his rehabilitation grant of 30 days pay and allowances and his clothing allowance immediately on discharge. The next month he will get his first gratuity payment. This payment will not exceed the amount of one month's pay and allowances which he was receiving at the time of discharge, including provision and lodging allowance in the case of the Navy, or subsistence allowance in the case of the Army and Air Force, all at Canadian rates. These monthly payments will be continued until such time as the gratuity has all been paid.

The War Service Gratuity, or any unpaid balance thereof is payable under certain conditions to dependents of a sailor, soldier or airman who died while serving, or before the gratuity was fully paid to him.

The gratuity is tax free and may not be assigned or attached for debt. Over payments of service pay and allowance, however, may be deducted from it. A Canadian who left Canada to serve with another of His Majesty's Forces, but who was domiciled in Canada on Sept. 10th, 1939 will be eligible for the gratuity and the credit provided he makes applications within one year of discharge and is then both domiciled and residing in Canada. However, a deduction will be made from the Canadian gratuity based on the amount of any grant of a similar nature received from the Government of the country with which he served.

Modern Breeding Reduces Disease

Trichomoniasis Declines With Growth of Artificial Insemination of Cattle

LONDON (CP) — Agriculture Minister Tom Williams disclosed that artificial insemination of cattle had greatly reduced trichomoniasis, a breeding disease, in a two-year test made in the Vale of Clwyd, Denbighshire.

"It would be wrong to claim that artificial insemination is the answer to other breeding troubles, but in the case of this disease the results are definitely encouraging," he said.

"This particular experiment can, therefore, be said to be approaching a happy conclusion. It had been decided that the Ministry shall continue to operate a service in that area to pursue the more intensive or more high technical aspects of artificial insemination research."

MINERALS AND VITAMINS

Minerals and vitamins are also important in winter pig feeding. The cereal grains are low in calcium (lime), hence the big need in pig rations is for lime or calcium supplements. Skim milk, buttermilk, commercial concentrate and tankage are well supplied with calcium. Lacking these additional materials, calcium in the form of high-calcium limestone should be added to the grain mixture at the rate of one pound limestone to 100 pounds of grains. Stiffness and crippling commonly develops if Vitamin D is not supplied and a lack of resistance to disease. Mixing one teaspoonful of a standard feeding oil in the feed daily for each pig will insure an adequate supply of both vitamins. The oil should be given until the pigs reach a weight of 100 to 110 pounds.

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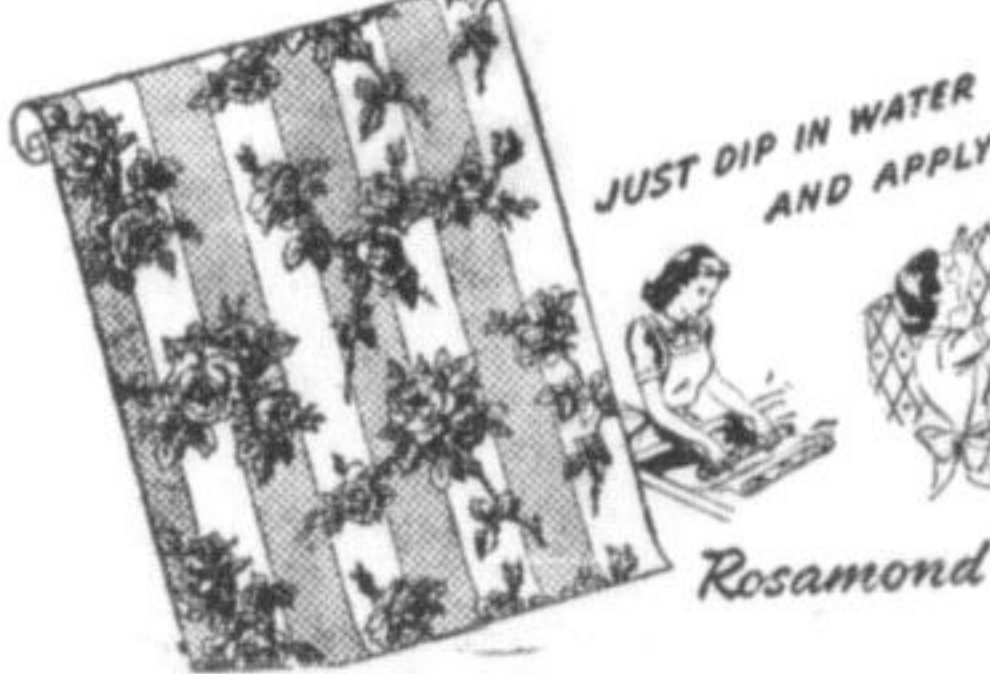
