BURLINGTON

Victory Loan sales simply rolled in over the week-end, Victory Loan headquarters announced last Wednesday morning, with the result that Tuesday's sales set Burlington and South Nelson over the top, the objective of \$520,000 having been reached.

Last week Mayor J. Gordon Blair received a letter from the commander of the H.M.C.S. Burlington, which is now de-commissioned and being salvaged. Accompanying the letter was the original scrap book presented to the ship when she was dedicated here on that big day in September 1941.

Esquering Council Purchases New Road Machinery

Total Cost of New Equipment to be \$12,650.00 — Open Season for Deer This Month

Reeve G. W. Murray called a meeting of the Esquering Council on Friday afternoon, October 26th, when all members of council were present.

Tenders had been asked for, for snow plowing equipment and they were opened at the meeting. Mr. J. D. Ludgate, Municipal Engineer attended in connection with the Tenders.

Representatives from four firms who handle such equipment were present, quoting prices and dates when delivery might be made. The Council finally decided to go and see the equipment in order that they might have a better idea of the different types of machinery.

The regular meeting of Esquering Township Council was held Monday afternoon November 5th. Deputy-Reeve George E. Cleave, Councillors George Currie, C. H. May and R. N. Brown were present. Reeve G. W. Murray presided. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted, and correspondence read.

There will be an open season for deer in Esquering on November 21, 22, 23 and 24. The township will be supplied with 100 licenses for sale on the basis of 60 per cent. to residents and 40 per cent. to non-residents, which may be secured from the Clerk.

Accounts were passed for payment as follows: Cecil Chisholm, re Voters List, \$6.44; A. W. Benton, re Voters List, \$5.64; G. W. Murray, A. W. Benton, Cecil Chisholm and I. M. Bennett selecting jurors, \$20.00; The Georgetown Herald account to date, \$17.07; A. W. Benton, stamps, \$4.00; H.E.P.C. Brampton, lights, \$4.05; Bell Telephone Co., services, \$10.75; Canadian Legion, Georgetown, Poppy Day Fund, \$15.00; Ontario Hospital, Woodstock re indigent, \$39.00; Dept. of Health, insulin, \$4.99; Relief Accounts, \$7.06; Jas. Russell, 1 ewe killed, \$12.00; Spencer Wilson, valuator, \$2.00; Federal Fire Insurance Co., renewal, \$20.00; General Fire Assurance Co., renewal, \$63.00. Road accounts of \$3,787.33 were also passed for payment.

The Clerk was instructed to prepare the necessary by-law to provide street lighting for Stewarttown. This hamlet had by petition requested street lights.

The Council recommended a speed limit of 30 miles per hour on the seventh line through Stewarttown and also on No. 7 Highway through Norval and by-laws were to be prepared.

A by-law was passed to empower the Clerk to collect penalties for non-payment of taxes after December 31, 1945.

Moved by Cleave, seconded by May, resolved that the Reeve and Treasurer are hereby authorized and empowered to sell and assign the following Dominion of Canada Bonds, registered on the books of the Department of Finance at Ottawa, in the name of Township of Esquering, Railway Bonus Fund, total \$3,300. Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Brown, that the Reeve and Treasurer are hereby authorized and empowered to sell and assign the following Dominion of Canada Bonds, registered on the books of the Department of Finance at Ottawa, in the name of Township of Esquering, Railway Bonus Fund, total \$6,500. Carried.

Moved by May, seconded by Cleave, that this Council purchase 1 International D14 Crawler type tractor, price \$6,040; Snow Plow for same at \$2,800 and Dozer at \$2,200, including cab for tractor, \$434, a total of \$11,474.00. Motion lost.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Brown, that this Council purchase 1 Caterpillar Tractor at \$6,875; Snow Plow at \$3,465 and Dozer at \$2,310, total of \$12,650.00. Carried.

Moved by Cleave, seconded by May, that this Council do now adjourn to meet December 15th at 10 a.m. or at the call of the Reeve. Carried.

RECOGNIZE SERVICES TO SCOTTISH FISHING

CAMPBELLTOWN, Scotland (CP) — Thomas Johnston, secretary of state for Scotland in the Churchill government, has been given the freedom of Campbelltown as a tribute to his "eminent services to the Scottish herring industry."

As the customary silver casket was unobtainable, a model west coast ringnet fishing boat was presented to him instead. It bears the title: "The Freedom C. N. 1945."

Campbelltown is the headquarters of the west coast herring industry. Mr. Johnston is its fifth honorary burgee since the town was made a royal burgh in 1700.
