Notice To Ratepayers
of Trafalgar School Area
On September 19, 1945, D. Roy Johnson of Bronte, purchased 100 ft. of property adjacent to Bronte Public School lawn, and extending 100 ft. in depth only, to build a modern Garage, costing approximately \$1000. After hearing rumors of expropriation by the school board, this property was offered to the board for a period of 5 days, for the sum of \$1200. but no offer was received and the expropriation proceedings were commenced on October 18.
At present the Court award is \$1843 plus \$150 Court costs. In addition, the Board must pay their own legal fees.
This judgment is not acceptable and further proceedings will be taken. Should the Board decide to drop this matter and return my property I am prepared to accept an extremely small sum for part of expense incurred.

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
