DR. G. E. REAMAN SPEAKER AT NORVAL JUNIOR FARMER RALLY

Dr. G. E. Reaman, of the English Department, O.A.C., Guelph, in an excellent address to a large gathering of Halton and Peel Junior Farmers recently, suggested as future guideposts for a better world, the four horsemen—science, common sense and experience, hope, and a philosophy of life. The subject of the evening developed as a parallelism to the book "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse."

He stressed the controlling position which science has acquired in our modern world and how we must harness it to make it beneficial. "After all, common sense is the best psychology in life," he said, and experience develops from the use of it. Hope for the future was a "must", he pointed out, as is a belief in the abilities of oneself, belief in other people and belief in God. The latter applied nationally as well as individually would make for world peace and security.

Mr. J. E. Whitelock, Agricultural Representative, introduced the guest speaker of the evening.

The meeting, which was held in Norval Parish Hall, was a special rally, sponsored by the Norval Junior Farmers to enlist new members in their Club, and other county and neighboring clubs were invited to share in the benefits of the evening. Douglas Currie, president of the Norval Juniors, was chairman for the program, which opened with a sing-song led by John Bird.

Members of the Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band, attractive in their kilts, gave several pipe selections and danced. Miss Isobel Archdekin, Streetsville, and Miss Grace Beerman, Georgetown were soloists. Mrs. Joe Lyons, Streetsville, added his valued talent in a lengthy humorous reading.

Fire Brigade Makes the Annual Report to Council

Progress Reports on Arena, Fire Escapes and Heating at the Town Hall — Mayor Dawson Thanked for his Broadcast on Milton on Sunday Morning — Other Items of Tuesday's Meeting

The regular bi-monthly meeting of Milton Council was held on Tuesday evening. Councillors J. W. Higgins, J. A. Rush, G. C. Gowland, S. A. Fay, R. H. Ptolemy, C. G. Riddell and Reeve C. H. Heslop were present with Mayor Geo. H. Dawson presiding.

A letter from the Lorne Scots Committee gave some details of the reception to be held for the regiment when the unit arrives as a body at Brampton in the near future. Council was to co-operate with this reception.

A report from the Milton Fire Brigade gave a resume of the activities of the Brigade for the year. There were 13 fires and the loss was \$2,585. It reported that all the Brigade equipment was in good condition except the truck, which had outlived its usefulness. A letter was to be sent by the Clerk to the Brigade thanking them for the concise report and also for the very useful work done by the Brigade.

A letter from the County Council notified Council of a plan to purchase more County booklets and wanted to know if Milton Council desired any extra copies. Council went over the book and made some corrections to it. A Committee was arranged to look after this matter.

A letter from Mrs. F. W. B. Fitzgerald stated that their firm had purchased the Ocean Accident and Guarantee Corporation from Mr. A. G. MacNabb and stated that they were prepared to be of any service for the town, which they were called on.

A sketch of the property sold to the County for the County's use near the C.P.R. was presented. The Clerk was to prepare the deed for the next meeting.

The Finance and Special Communication Committee passed the above accounts and others for payment totalling \$1,471.99.

The Clerk was instructed to obtain copies of the new labor regulations.

Solicitor George Elliott presented a draft of the deed of the property to be purchased by the town for the erection of a sewage disposal plant, from Dr. Martin. The draft was to be accepted after one point was clarified.

An enquiry had been made to Clerk Blain for the pipes and radiators not being used in the Town Hall. This matter was left in the hands of the Town Hall and Property Committee.

The Clerk was instructed to write Mr. C. Toletzky that the town was not prepared to install a street light at the rear of his property and pay for it.

The Committee recommended the removal of one building from the Tennis Club property for use by the town at the arena.

Members of the Streets and Walks Committee were to check on the snow fence belonging to the Corporation.

Councillor Riddell reported on the progress being made to have the arena ready for winter sports.

A report on the heating system stated the representative of the heating firm would be in town on Friday. The fire escapes for the Town Hall were practically installed.

Mayor Dawson brought up the matter of another nomination for the vacancies on the Council and School Board. Members of Council expressed regret to the members who did not qualify for 1946 Council in the loss of these experienced Council members from the Council.

Reeve Heslop thanked Mayor Dawson for the radio broadcast made by him on Sunday last. Council felt it was a good job well done. Mayor Dawson explained the features he found interesting at the broadcasting station on his visit there.

C. F. PICKETT TOPS HUSKING CORN COMPETITION

The results of the husking corn competition sponsored jointly by the Esquing Agricultural Society and the Halton Crop Improvement Association have just been announced by Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock.

C. F. Pickett of Georgetown won the top award with a yield of 71.46 bus. of shelled corn per acre, and thereby wins the Canadian Industries Limited Special which entitles the winner to commercial fertilizer to the value of \$50.00. All yields were calculated on a 15 per cent. moisture content. Mr. Pickett's crop was of the DeKalb variety. Spencer Wilson of Norval was runner-up with a yield of 60.7 bus. per acre from Funks 176 G variety. The other awards were as follows: M. T. McNabb and Sons, Georgetown, yield 58.31 bus., DeKalb 65; W. F. Thompson, Georgetown, yield 57.18 bus., DeKalb 65; Gordon Hume, Milton, yield 55.19 bus., Pioneer 355; Fred Nurse, Georgetown, yield 53.14 bus., Canada 355; Harvey Nurse, Georgetown, yield 52.45 bus., Pioneer 355; J. Alexander and Sons, Georgetown, yield 51.22 bus., DeKalb 65; T. J. Brownridge, Georgetown, yield 48.81 bus., DeKalb 65; K. C. Lindsay, Georgetown, yield 48.50 bus., DeKalb 65; W. E. Breckon, Freeman, yield 32.27 bus., DeKalb 65; F. W. Riddell and Sons, Georgetown, yield 31.87 bus., DeKalb 65.

The average yield of the twelve competitors was 51.76 bus. which considering the unfavorable corn year would be considered very good.

LINDALE BASILUA MAKES FIVE YEAR RECORD AS PRODUCER

The Jersey Cow, Lindale Basilua, 110677, owned and bred by Maurice Beaty, Milton, Ont., has completed a five year old record producing 15,665 lbs. of milk and 796 lbs. of fat with an average test of 5.08 per cent. Basilua, if she freshens in time, will be awarded a Gold Medal Certificate by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. Basilua is one of the high record daughters of the sensational Brampton Jerseys' sire, Brampton Basilius.

Palermo Juniors Entertain Seniors At December Meeting

The December meeting of the Palermo Juniors was held in the Palermo Community Hall on Wednesday evening, November 28th. Inasmuch as this was the annual open night, an invitation had been extended to the parents and also to members of the Palermo Women's Institute. Miss Mary Vivian, President of the Junior Homemakers was in charge of the girls' meeting. The feature of this program was an address and demonstration on Interior Decoration, by Mrs. Wm. Gooch, which was very much enjoyed by junior and senior homemakers alike.

At the same time the Junior Farmers, with President Grant Heslop in charge, had a most interesting session with Prof. Frank Wolfe of the Animal Husbandry, O.A.C. Prof. Wolfe, who was introduced by Geo. S. Atkins, one of the past presidents of the Club, gave a most comprehensive and interesting address on Artificial Breeding and development of Artificial Breeding from the middle of the sixteenth century up to the present day. The advantage and weaknesses of the system from the standpoint of co-operative units were also clearly explained. This excellent address concluded with a set of slides illustrating the subject.

At the joint meeting which was also presided over by Dr. Heslop, V.S., a sound picture in technicolor entitled "The Science of Milk Production" was presented through the courtesy of the Ralston Purina Co. by Mr. Harold Pressey of Burlington. This excellent picture is based on the work of Dr. W. E. Peterson, University of Minnesota.

The program also included vocal selections by Miss Evelyn Felletterio and Robert Wheelband which contributed much to the enjoyment of the evening.

And so concluded an early hour the next morning one of the most interesting and educational meetings ever staged in Halton County. It was, however, unfortunate that unfavorable weather conditions prevented a larger turn-out.

HALTON COUNTY RURAL YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASS'N.

County meetings to be held during the winter months was the chief consideration of the Halton Rural Young People's Association when representatives from the Halton Junior Farmer Clubs met in Milton on November 26th. John Y. McNabb, president, conducted the meeting.

To inaugurate the winter program it was decided to create interest by holding a county rally of Junior Farmers and young people on Fri., Jan. 11, 1946 in Milton High School with Mr. McIntyre Hood, Junior Farmer News editor, as speaker. The Junior Clubs are to be responsible for the other numbers on the program and the evening is to be concluded by a short informal dance.

The succeeding monthly meetings are to be a series of inter-club debates Acton and Norval coming together in the first contest, to be held at the February meeting. The subject is, Resolved that organized labor is a greater danger to the state than organized capital. Other debates are also to be held in March and April. Rules for the debates were discussed and formulated.

Possibility also of having an "Invitation" County Dance at the Brant Inn in the spring, was discussed as a probable climax to the winter program. The executive is hopeful that Halton County Juniors will give their full support to make their county winter programs a success.

Edmund Scarr charged with assaulting C. K. Browne of Acton on December 4th, armed with an automatic revolver with attempt to rob was remanded for one week at the request of the Crown.
