Laboratory Aids Prairie Farmers

Specialists to Advise on Machinery and Electrical **Problems**

SWIFT CURRENT, Sask. (CP) -Prairie farmers from the Rockies to Manitoba can expect soon to get authoritative answers from the new federal agricultural engineering laboratory at the experimental station here on almost any farm machinery and electrical problem.

The new laboratory, announced by the Dominion government at the last Truth Shall Make You Free-Jno. 8: 32 "All that we bring into the lives of by April. And when it gets into stride, it will have the answers to questions ranging from what a farmer should use for a certain type of dirt moving project to how he should go about ventilating or electrifying his henhouse or barn.

One of its main services will be to act as liaison between the farmer and Canada's big machinery manufacturing business which has an estimated annual turnover of \$600,000,000 a year.

This business will soon be turning out machinery that has been scarce many. Your heart, too, will be stirduring the war years. L. B. Thompson, superintendent of the Swift Current Station, said it will value each piece of machinery without regard to its make. It will be given a rating on its capability to do the job required and the information will be passed along to machinery users through bulletins, circulars and correspondence.

Trapped in Attic By "Arctic" Bear

Brown Beast Sleeps in Cabin After Eating Tub of Bread

GRAND PRAIRIE, Atla. (CP)—Big Jim Fells, a trapper of the Bezanson district near this community, 107 miles north and 103 miles west of Edmonton, took to the attic in one of his cabins along the Liard River and stayed there all one night, despite sub-zero weather.

Fells has good reason for his trip to the attic-he was held prisoner for 20 hours by a huge brown bear, which weighed half a ton. He saw the bear approaching his cabin-not the black type usually found in this district but a heavy brown beast "from the Arctic."

The bear ignored Fells' snarling dogs, headed for a tub of frozen bread which he kept oustide. Fells had only a .22-calfbre rifle as a weapon. He lost no time throwing it and his sleeping bag into the attic and climbing after them.

As the trapper watched, the bear, after finishing the bread, put his weight against the door and broke into the cabin. He went peacefully to sleep after eating all the food, breakup the furniture and pawing bedclothes to the floor.

Next day Fells made a hole in the roof, signalled a friend, who, carrying a .303 rifle, was approaching the cabin. Fells shot the bear behind the ear and as the startled bruin jumped through a window the neighbor finished it with a single shot.
