\$27.50 INVESTMENT BASIS OF BUSINESS

ROSTERN, Sask. (CP)—A business started on a capital investment of \$27.50 has flourished for Peter Epp and his son, Edmund. They make hand-propelled washing machines.

It's the old story of necessity being the mother of invention. Epp was a hardware merchant during the depression years and found it necessary to turn to something else for a livelihood.

So he started making grain boxes, then door and window sash and then invested \$27.50 in materials to make a washing machine which could be used in the rural home where there is no electric power.

To-day he and his son have a plant employing 8 men, turning out about 160 machines a month.


