The afternoon program brought many Senior Institute members and Senior Homemakers, who followed the demonstrations with keen interest. Among the visitors was Miss Lotta Dempsey of Chatelaine, who is writing a story on Halton Junior Homemakers for their August issue.

At the same time, 70 Junior Farmers with Agricultural Representative J. E.
