ailable to service the town adequately. Mr. G. O'Leary and Mrs. A. Armstrong of the Legion were present to discuss with the Council the proposed lease of the Arena. The draft deed was gone over with Council and a number of clauses were changed to the satisfaction of those present. The Council agreed to changes being made and the proposed rental was changed to \$750 a year, plus a share if the profits reached a certain amount. The draft is to be made out again with the changes so that the Legion Committee could bring this matter to the next Legion meeting for discussion. As yet, no lease has been signed.

Mr. Randall, fire chief, brought up the matter of taking on firemen, who had enlisted and have returned to Milton. A full brigade is on the records at the present time. The matter was left for the Fire Brigade to work out.

Mr. Rowney requested that the Council sell 10 feet off a town lot to allow him more room at his property. The Council rejected the proposal as it would spoil the other lot for building purposes.

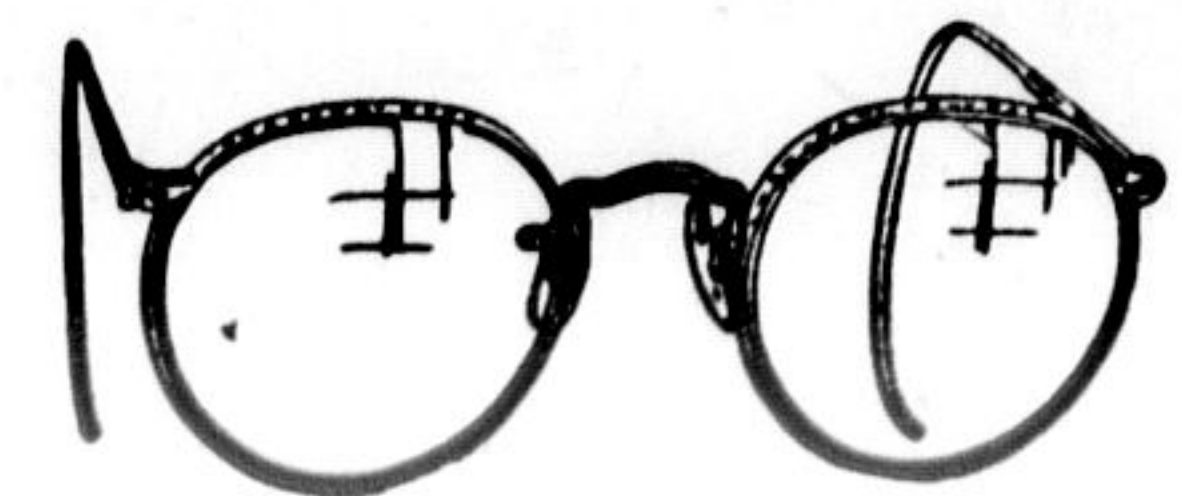
