they then stay in office for a two-year term."

Each chairman is to go over their estimates and have a report on expenditures made for the present year at the next Council meeting.

A letter from the Solicitor was to be sent re the collection of an account owing the Corporation.

The enforcement of the curfew law as passed by the Ontario Statutes was discussed and the matter cleared up. Chief Canning had had a case the past week and a conviction had been registered.

The committee gave a report on the progress being made on plans for renovating the auditorium of the Town Hall. A number of suggestions were made for improving the auditorium but no action was taken.

Inquiries were made by citizens on having two through trains on the C.P. R. stop at Milton. A motion was passed asking the Clerk to write the divisional superintendent to have these two trains stop.

A motion was passed requesting the Hydro to instal a street light on Woodward Ave. at the bridge.

Instructions were issued to the town foreman to have the holes in the sidewalks on various streets filled in before someone is injured.

A break in the water main near Cavell's Garage was reported to the Waterworks Committee.

A suggestion was made that a party be held for the children at Christmas time. No action was taken on this matter.

Chief Canning was present to request a by-law prohibiting the parking of trucks larger than half ton on parts of Main and Martin Streets. Council gave permission to the Chief to have this by-law drawn up.

The suggestion that the colored lights be installed for the Christmas season was referred to the Light and Police Committee for investigation.

Mayor Dawson reported that he was definitely retiring as Chief Executive for Milton at the end of this year. Council adjourned at 11. p.m.
