U.B.C. Library Gets Diderot Masterpiece

Famed Encyclopedia Developed Ideas Which Set Off French Revolution

VANCOUVER (CP)-A set of encyclopedias which helped launch revolution and evolved a complete new pattern of ideals has come to rest in the University of British Columbia library after nearly two centuries.

The set, recently arrived from London, is one of the few copies in Canada, and one of the best-preserved in existence.

It was compiled by Denis Diderot, between 1751 and 1777 and outlined new ideas of human rights which had a part in the Parisians' attack on autocracy in 1789.

Subscribers to Diderot's work paid the equivalent of 130 pounds a set. He is said to have made less than that in yearly earnings from his books.

The volumes will not be displayed openly at the university due to their monetary and historical value. Students will require special permission to study them.

Though its members have sadly diminished, Ontario still lists it as game. The Cock-of-the-Woods is a big black and white, scarlet-capped Woodpecker. It has increased somewhat in settled Ontario and should receive every protection because it imparts a special flavor to the woodland scene by its boisterous call and striking plumage.


