Question 2, the 1946 wheat agreement between Canada and Great Britain sacrifices the opportunity of selling at higher prices now for the assurance of stabilized prices the next four years. Is this a sound principle? The group answered Yes. The reasons were given. It was better to know your position for producing wheat than to have higher prices now and drastically lower prices when world production approached normalcy.
