Obituary

THOMAS SNOW

Funeral service was conducted for Thomas Snow last Wednesday from his late residence, Town Line, Nelson Township, by Rev. Mr. McPhail and Rev. N. Cronsberry. Interment followed in Omagh Church Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Clarence Snow, Gordon Snow, James Snow, Clarence Galbraith, Gordon Turner and Howard Turner. Flower bearers were Elwood Snow, Archie Gates, Samuel Snow, Donald Prince, Stewart McFadden, Colin Marshall, Tommie Snow, Kenneth Galbraith and Earl Galbraith.

Mr. Snow a well-known farmer in the district, passed away suddenly on Monday, January 14th. Born in Es-quesing Township 59 years ago, Mr. Snow moved to this district, where he has farmed for 28 years. He was a member of Omagh Presbyterian Church.

Surviving besides his widow, the former Flora Galbraith, is a son Earl, four brothers, Wilfred and Edward at Milton, John at Ballinadaf, Samuel at Acton, and a sister, Mrs. Bella McDowell, at London.

MRS. CHAS. JAMES WHEELER

Euphemia Shortreed Wheeler, beloved wife of the late Charles James Wheeler, both members of families well known in Halton, Dufferin and Peel Counties, passed away at her home in Toronto on January 11th and was laid to rest beside her husband in the Wheeler family plot at Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Mrs. Wheeler, aged 74, was born at Mansewood, the eldest daughter of the late Abraham and Isabella Wooding. In the early 90's she attended High School in Georgetown and in 1900 married Charles, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas James Wheeler of Georgetown. They lived for several years in Orangeville where her husband learned newspaper typography with his cousin, the late Blainey McGuire. Subsequently they moved to Toronto. Her husband died in 1941.

The funeral was held from St. David's Anglican Church, of which Mrs. Wheeler was a devoted worker for 38 years. For the past 32 years hers has been the weekly responsibility of seeing that the flowers were on the altar for the Sunday services. The service at the church, which was largely attended, was conducted by the rector, Canon H. A. Bracken, deceased's brother-in-law, and by his son and her nephew, Rev. Newman Bracken of Hockley Valley. The latter conducted the burial rites at Georgetown. Canon Bracken, who has been in charge of St. David's since its inception 40 years ago, referred simply but eloquently to the loving care given by Mrs. Wheeler to the discharge of her Altar Guild duties.

Mrs. Wheeler is survived by one son, Thomas James, formerly managing editor of the Toronto Daily Star and the Star Weekly and now head of a newspaper syndicate. Several

years ago her son bought a property in East Garafraxa Twp., near Orangeville, where Mrs. Wheeler spent the summer months. Also surviving are three sisters: Annie, wife of Amos R. Newell, Milton West; Nellie, widow of the late Edward Hagyard, Guelph and Mary, widow of the late Richard Joyce, formerly of Mansewood and now of Toronto. Another sister, Agnes, wife of Canon Bracken, died in 1925 and a brother, John in 1938.

FRED BENNETT SUSTAINED SERIOUS INJURY TO HIS EYE

Fred Bennett, a local carpenter, met with an unfortunate mishap, while on a construction job on Monday when a nail he was driving, bounced from a knot in a plank, striking him in the eye.
