**MILTON BUSINESS IN LINE WITH KEEPING PRICES AT LOW LEVEL**

In order to prevent inflation many merchants throughout the United States have announced a ten percent reduction on everything within their retail stores. Some merchants in smaller centers have announced similar reductions in the price of their stock. Only last week merchants in Mimico and Port Credit were given publicity that they had reduced their prices by a similar amount, stating it was in the interests of the working man, they had taken such action.

This movement has spread to Milton, with Stan Fay, prominent in the plumbing and tinsmith industry here, announced by signs in his window that effective at the beginning of the week, "In order to do our part a 10 percent reduction will be made on all over the counter cash sales."

Mr. Fay is to be congratulated for taking this move, which will benefit many of his customers from Milton and surrounding district. Although the plan took effect before the announcement of the budget, it will surely affect you and I and the other fellow, who is in the lower income brackets.

Should merchants all over the country endorse this movement, manufacturers can do no more than to fall in line. As one Toronto textile and knitting manufacturer said when he announced last week a similar program, "The wholesaler and retailer will have to assume the same program."
