Halton Streams Restocked by Game Warden



During last week-end, as anglers tested their luck in many of Halton's trout streams, Game Warden Dudley Hitchox, of Oakville, was restock ng the upper portion of the Sixteen Mile Creek and Blue Springs stream with some 3,600 speckled trout fingerlings.
