# BOTTLE MOUSE TRAP

A devastating plague of mice in the Malee district of Victoria, Australia, has resuscitated an old idea of a mouse trap, with an Australian angle to it. A piece of cheese for bait is plugged into the mouth of a beer bottle which is fixed horizontally above a kerosene can filled with water. # WORLD'S FIRST ALUMINUM MOVING BRIDGE

The first moving-span bridge in the world to be constructed of aluminum alloys is to be built over the river Wear in North England. Its weight will be only 40% of an equivalent steel bridge, yet it will be just as strong, far less susceptible to corrosion and more economical in power used by the lifting mechanism. The bridge will carry a railroad track of standard gauge, as well as road traffic, over a 90-foot span of the river.

# Halton School Pupils Guests Of County Council

(Continued from Page One)

is the opinion of the High School Board and members of the council of Georgetown, civic pride demands the continuance of a high school in Georgetown—that discontinuing the high school facilities in this community of over 3,000 people, would seriously interrupt the steady progress of the municipality and would be contrary to the expressed wishes of all the citizens of the town.

"We are unalterably opposed to the establishment and maintenance of a District High School unless it is located in the most central urban municipality of Northern Halton County, which is the Town of Georgetown."

Council also asked Mr. Skuce to interview Trafalgar Township to inquire if they would desire the northern portion of the Township to be included in the area.

I. C. Marratt, Reforestation Division of the Department of Lands and Forests, spoke to Council on a reforestation program. He suggested Council purchase 100 acres each year for this purpose, adding they already owned between six and seven hundred acres under reforestation program.

The government expects to have about 30,000 ring necked pheasant to be distributed throughout the province, Dr. C. H. D. Clarke, of the same department told Council. He said that loss of birds during past distribution had been heavy, but they were working on a plan to erect pens to house the pullets before they were turned loose. He asked Council for their cooperation with this plan.

At the close of the business session, W. S. Hall, chairman of the Finance committee announced \$55 in prizes would be awarded to the first 10 boys and girls submitting the best essay on "Our Visit to County Council." He said the closing date would be May 31st.

Council approved of a recommendation that the caretaker of the county buildings salary be increased from \$350 a year to \$400 retroactive from January 1947.

Members of the County Roads committee stated a sum of \$917.33 was received from rental of equipment which would reduce the expenditures by that amount.

Council adjourned to meet June 10 at 10.30 a.m. Photos taken during the day will appear in this paper next week.

# RESULTS OF SUFFERAGE

What have been the results of the past twenty-five years of the extension of the voting right to women. One result has been a very great interest by women in question of politics and government. These subjects are discussed by them in their clubs and various organizations, also in home and social circles. Their constant study of these issues adds to popular intelligence on public questions.

One result is that the women's point of view gets a more adequate hearing than it did in the old days. The women are very keenly interested in the welfare of children, and they make a special study of the needs of the boys and girls, and are highly intelligent on these questions. Their influence is strongly felt on questions of policy relating to boys and girls. Thus in many ways women have become a great power in political life.
