BOTTLE MOUSE TRAP

A devastating plague of mice in the Malee district of Victoria, Australia, has resuscitated an old idea of a mouse trap, with an Australian angle to it. A piece of cheese for bait is plugged into the mouth of a beer bottle which is fixed horizontally above a kerosene can filled with water. Leading to the trap is a board, up which the mouse climbs and runs along the bottle toward the cheese, but slips on the well greased neck of the bottle. The mouse falls into the water and is drowned. One farmer, says the Australian News, claims to have caught 2,400 mice in this way within 12 hours.

WORLD'S FIRST ALUMINUM MOVING BRIDGE

The first moving-span bridge in the world to be constructed of aluminum alloys is to be built over the river Wear in North England. Its weight will be only 40% of an equivalent steel bridge, yet it will be just as strong, far less susceptible to corrosion and more economical in power used by the lifting mechanism. The bridge will carry a railroad track of standard gauge, as well as road traffic, over a 90-foot span of the river.
