CROP IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION OF HALTON MEETING AUGUST 11th

According to C. L. S. Palmer, the President of the Halton Crop Improvement Association an evening meeting is being held by the Association on the farm of George Currie & Sons, lot 6, of the 7th line, Esqueing Township, just two miles above Hornby, on Monday, August 11 at 7:30 p.m.

On this farm the local Crop Improvement Association in co-operation with the Field Husbandry Department of the O. A. C. laid down replicated variety tests with some 18 varieties of oats and barley. Professor James Laughland of Guelph will lead in the discussion on these varieties and other crop problems. It is also anticipated that Kenneth McNaught of the Crops, Seeds and Weeds Branch, Toronto, will be on hand to discuss chemical weed killers and long term pastures. We also understand that R. S. Heatherington, National Film Board operator will screen one or two educational films.

Hearing Adjourned On Bank Suspect In Milton Court

While Tony DeCecca, of Hamilton, charged with taking part in two bank robberies, did not appear before Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon when his name was called in Magistrate's Court yesterday, Crown Attorney W. I. Dick, K.C., informed the court his counsel M. F. Hazel, of Hamilton, agreed to the Crown's request in absentia, that the accused's hearing be adjourned sine-die.

Mr. Dick informed the court that DeCecca was in custody in Welland, and that the bail money of \$10,000 he endorsed back to the bondsmen who were accused's brother and mother.

Marion Smith, of Burlington, was remanded to Court hearing in Burlington to-day, when she appeared charged with vagrancy, causing a disturbance while being drunk in Burlington August 5th. Bail was set at \$25.

Pleading guilty to a charge of non support, G. C. Twiss was remanded until August 20th for sentence. At that time, if accused has paid \$220, half of the amount owing to his wife, he will be placed on suspended sentence. If he fails to make the payment accused is to serve 30 days in jail, the court ruled.

CANADIAN RAMS BELOW NEW ZEALAND STANDARDS

Southdown rams from Canada were sold at a recent auction in New Zealand. While they brought fair average prices, they were described as being "too dumpy and not long enough in the hind quarters." The loin and leg are the most valuable parts of the fat lamb carcass, and consequently the New Zealand breeder aims at securing maximum development of these parts.

While the Canadian rams possessed good width of hind quarters, they were not considered to exhibit any marked superiority in the other desired characteristics of length and depth of the leg of mutton. Comments by some New Zealand breeders present at the sale, on the score of size, indicated that the market demanded larger sheep with somewhat stronger bone.

HOUSING IN BRITAIN RECOVERS RAPIDLY FROM WINTER SET-BACK

A rapid recovery from the set-back due to unprecedented weather conditions in January and February has been made by Britain's builders. Severe and prolonged frosts with heavy snowfalls followed by widespread flooding brought work on housing to a standstill for several weeks. But official returns for April just published show the number of permanent homes completed in that month was only 279 short of the figure recorded for December which was the highest monthly total since the postwar building program was initiated. During April 14,667 houses were built of which well over 9,000 were permanent and practically 5,000 temporary.
