## NAVY BAND WILL BE MUSICAL FEATURE AT 1947 C.N.E.

To entertain music lovers at the Canadian National Exhibition from August 22 to September 6, the United States Navy Band will bring 350 pounds of music, in charge of two librarians.

Returning this year by popular request, the band won great favor at the previous Exhibition in 1941.

Comprised of 78 musicians, the band is under the direction of Lieutenant-Commander Charles Brender. He has a phenomenal memory for the symphonies and his colorful program will embody the great works and current musical comedy hits. Program will include considerable British music and London hits and Conductor Brender also pays heed to selections which are popular among the young people.

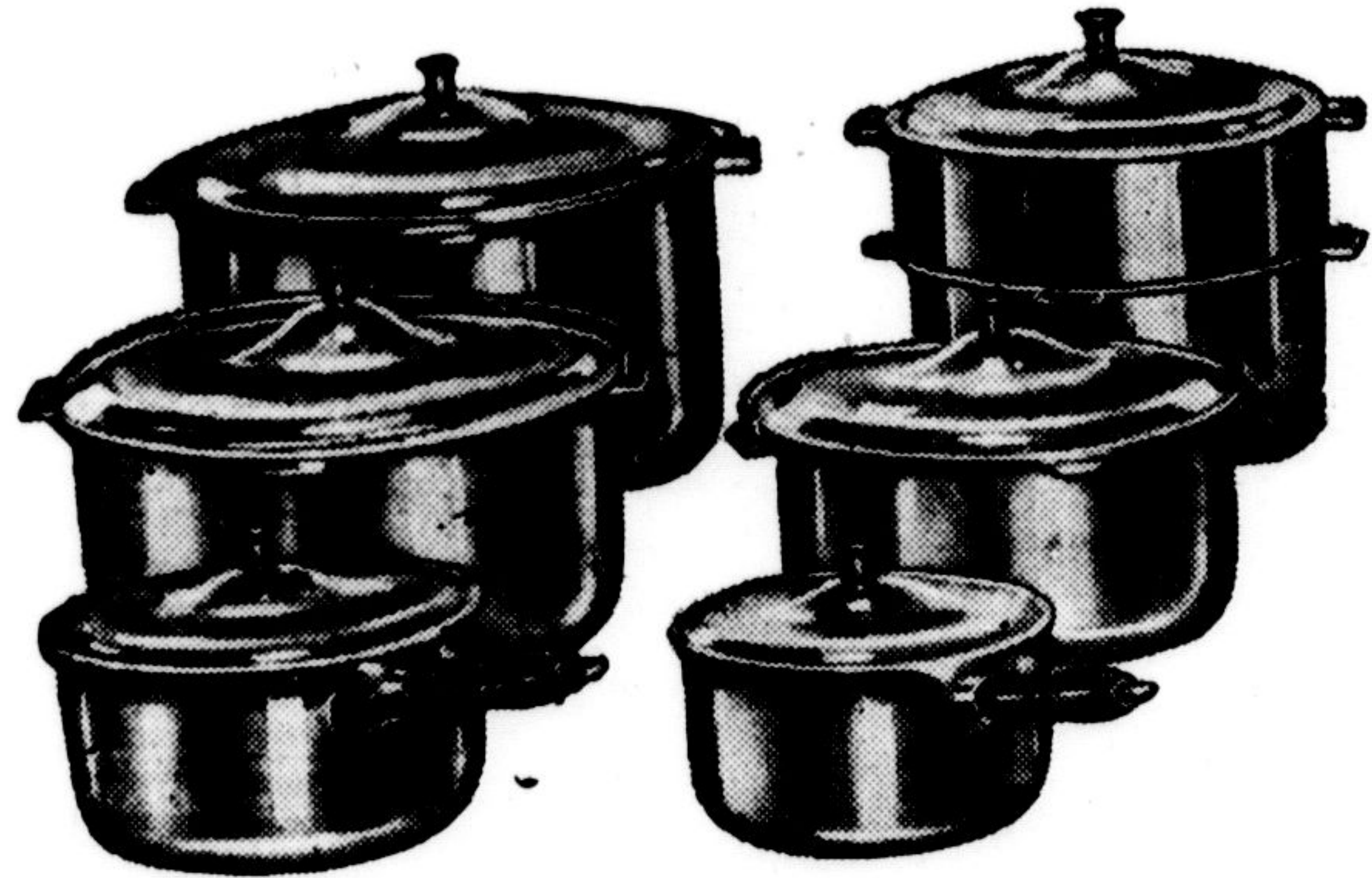

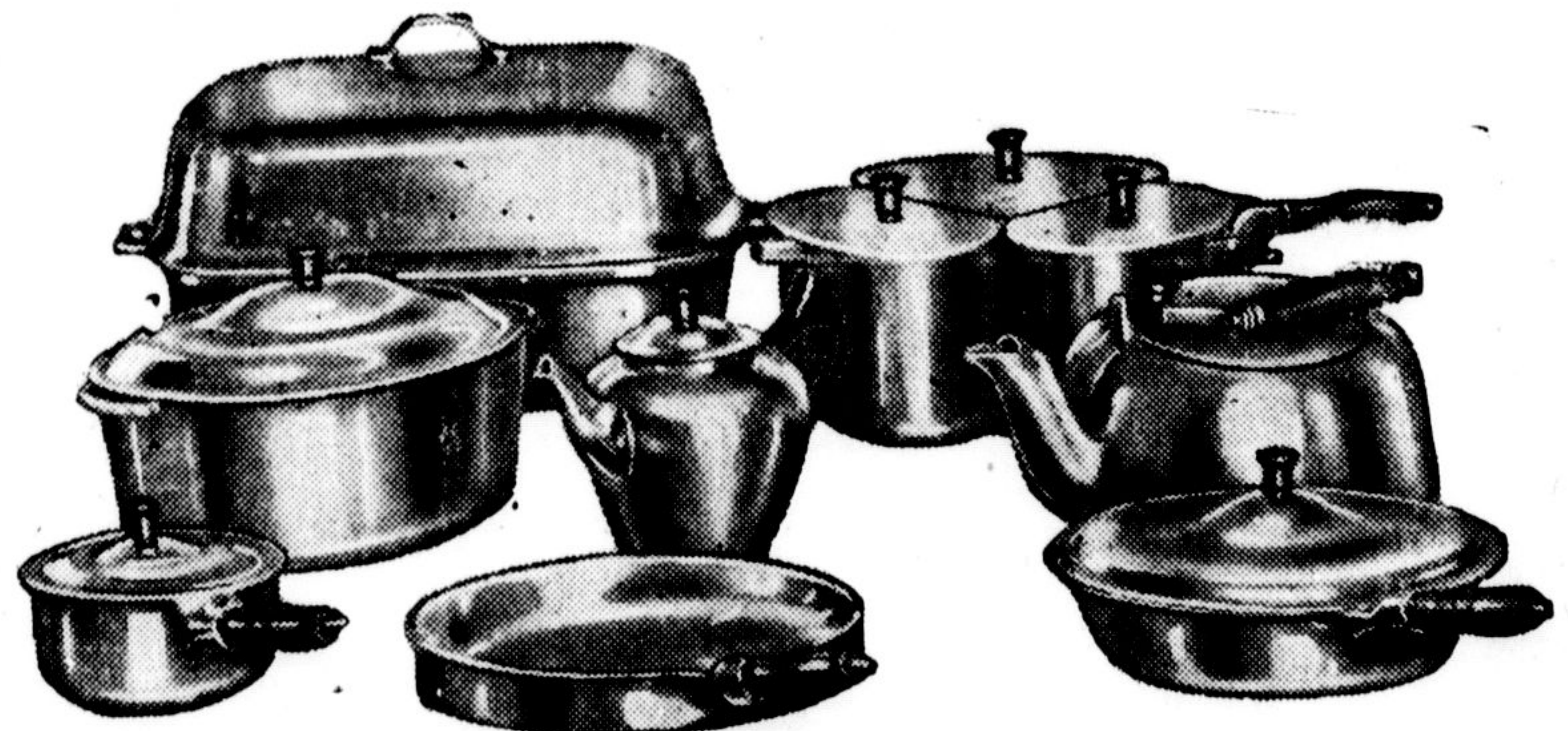
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
