County Roads Get Second Place to Highway Contracts

While County roads have been allowed to deteriorate, County equipment has been permitted to contract for individual jobs in re-surfacing in other centres. A couple of weeks ago the repair equipment was taken off the job and removed to Georgetown where a strip of road was re-surfaced on Number Seven Highway. Repairing had been continuing on the Base Line up until this time and the remaining portion of road was in such bad condition motorists and truckers were unable to travel at a greater speed than twenty miles an hour.

The four Townships, which are not so efficiently equipped with machinery have been keeping their roads in excellent condition this year. All their work is supervised by a superintendent while the County with an engineer and heavy equipment have been unable to cope with the situation.

Concrete thoroughfare and macadam shoulders on both the Seventh Line below Hornby and the portion of the Second line from Palermo south have become choppy to the extent that pot holes appear in many sections.

In an interview with George Cleave, chairman of the County Road Committee, his remarks could be summed up in, "Well, they help us out," (the department of Highways).

Additional heavy equipment purchased by the county from year to year, will soon place them in a position where they will be able to construct their own hard surfaced roadways. Should they continue to permit their engineer to contract for work in other municipalities and do re-surfacing for others, it will be many years before county roads are such as the taxpayers can be proud of.

Holiday swimming and bathing can be made safer, and therefore more enjoyable, if some common-sense rules are followed. JAMES H. WINN
James H. Winn, veteran of World War I, died in Westminster Hospital, London, on Tuesday, July 29th, in his 58th year.

Born in Hamilton, Mr. Winn moved to Milton with his family where he was employed as a shoemaker in his uncle's shoe factory. In his younger life he took an active part in the sports of the town, being a member of the famous Milton Fire Brigade running team. After leaving Milton he moved to Toronto, where he joined the 48th Highlanders. He saw active service during the entire World War I. He was taken prisoner of war and served 29 months in a German prison camp. On being released after the Armistice was signed, he returned to Canada, and made his home in Galt. From there he went to Detroit, where he was employed with the General Baking Co. for 28 years. Owing to ill health he retired.

He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, Mrs. Emily Amelia Winn, and six children, all residing in the U.S.A.; also seven brothers, Will, of Brandon, Man.; Art and Dr. N. D. Winn of Toronto; Ebb, of Rodney, Ont.; Campbell, of Campbellville; George of Galt and Robert of Pembroke.

Funeral service was held at Harris and Skinner Funeral Home, London, Ont., on Friday, August 1st. Interment in Woodlawn Cemetery. The service was conducted by the Rev. C. W. Cline, Anglican clergy in World War I. The pallbearers were World War I veterans.

PETER PEDDIE

A life-long resident of Esquesing passed away suddenly in Milton, on Saturday afternoon, August 9th from a heart attack, in the person of Mr. Peter Peddie.

Mr. Peddie was on his way to the ball game, being always interested in sports, when the fatal seizure struck him.

Born in Esquesing on the farm which he owned, he was the son of the late Peter Peddie and Mary Downey Peddie. He had attended Ligny School and was a member of the Presbyterian Church. He was also chairman of Esquesing Liberal Association and Past President of Halton Ploughmen's Association. Mr. Peddie was in his 67th year and was highly esteemed by all. The many beautiful flowers and very largely attended funeral testified to his esteem in this community.

He is survived by his wife, the former Margaret Telfer; two sons, Kenneth at home and Telfer of Penhold, Alta.; two daughters, Marion at home and Mrs. Manley Densmore (Isobel) Georgetown and three grandchildren. Also one sister Mrs. J. Coulson (Mary), Angus; two brothers R. A. Peddie, Toronto and John Peddie, Brandon, Man.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. E. J. Phinn of Knox Church, Milton, assisted by Rev. Gordon A. Peddie, of Walkerton, a nephew.

The pallbearers were Messrs. T. Chisholm, F. Chisholm, J. Elliott, B. Hume, E. Harrop, C. Robertson with the nephews as flower bearers. Interment took place in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

DRIVING SCHOOLS TEACH SAFETY AT THE WHEEL

With Ontario's motoring public becoming increasingly safety conscious, schools of driving are now beginning to play a useful part in making our street and highways safer for drivers and pedestrians and children at play. Under competent instructors, beginners are taught how to operate their cars skilfully, and with due regard to traffic rules and safety requirements.

Extreme nervousness and extreme over-confidence are common causes of traffic accidents, according to one professional driving school. In the one instance, lessons are designed to remove the tense attitude of the pupil so that his reflexes will be equal to an emergency; in the other, the school insists on periodic check-ups on the pupil who "knows it all."

One of the Toronto driving schools reports that about the same number of men and women take the course but—fewer women fail to pass the required test for obtaining driver's license. Not only are they as apt as the men at learning the fundamentals of driving but they remember better what they are told, an instructor said.

He pointed out that most pupils are nervous when taking the test and that one of his problems was to get them into a more relaxed frame of mind. He believes that "a proper knowledge and constant observance of traffic rules and regulations is a prime requisite for safe driving."

Another leading instructor thought that the experienced driver who had become too confident of his ability was a potential menace on the highways.
