—The Ex is a popular place for many from this district just now.

—The exterior of Milton post office is being treated with a fresh coat of paint.

—Prize Lists for Milton Fair will be issued next week by Secretary E. M. Readhead.

HERE'S A SPRAY DOGS, CATS SHUN

Ornamental plants on front porches, flowers and shrubs in the front garden, and the corner posts of porches may be protected from damage by dogs and cats by the simple use of a dilute nicotine spray. The spray is harmless but its smell is very offensive to cats and dogs even when applied so thinly that persons are unaware of its presence.

The name of the material is nicotine sulphate and may be bought at any seed or drug store. The spray is prepared by mixing one half teaspoon of the nicotine sulphate with one gallon of water. This makes the mixture strong enough for ordinary circumstances. The spray evaporates and should be renewed after rain, otherwise in good weather spraying every 2 weeks is sufficient. Once they have sniffed the spray, the dogs will patronize the other side of the road in their favorite rambles round the town. Sprayed on small pieces of wood, the nicotine will prevent cats from making their nightly boudoirs among the rows of the prettiest flowers in the back garden plots.

The sudden death of Mr. Robert William Wilson from a heart attack on Wednesday, August 20th, at the home of his grandson, Mr. Benjamin Wilson, lot 26, concession 3, Nassagaweya, came as a great shock to his many friends and relatives in this district.

Funeral services were held on Saturday from the home of his son, William R. Wilson, lot 27, concession 2, Nassagaweya. Following private services at the home, his pastor, the Rev. F. Williamson conducted services in the Presbyterian Church and at the grave side in Eden Mills Cemetery where burial was made.

Predeceased by his wife and his only daughter, Mrs. William Webb (Carrie), several years ago, Mr. Wilson leaves to mourn his loss three sons, Stanley of Eden Mills, James of Acton and William of Campbellville, R. POISON IVY MENACE IN SUMMER

Poison ivy, sometimes called poison oak, poison vine and three-leaved ivy, is a native perennial. It grows in all types of soil and especially in places that cannot be cultivated. The plant is a low shrub, sometimes clinging to the ground and at other times from six to 18 inches in height. It spreads from underground roots and from seeds. Flowers, usually found under the leaves, are green and white; seeds a greenish-white or cream color and stay on the plant even over the winter. The plant can be recognized by its three leaves on one stem, smooth, often glossy green with edges toothed on one side, pointed and egg-shaped. It can be distinguished from the Virginia Creeper, which always has five leaves.

Poison ivy has a very harmful toxic action on the skin. Most people who come in contact with it suffer, making it a menace to children, summer visitors and campers. Most people do not recognize the plant but all may suffer severely from contact. Everyone should be able to identify this plant and shun contact with it. There are several cures from contact and a simple precaution is to wash the parts contacted with a good, strong, warm soap solution. When anyone becomes affected, it is always best to consult a physician.

Poison ivy can be eradicated by cultivation, but usually it is found in locations impossible to cultivate. Small plots can be grubbed out, but rubber gloves and boots should be used, washing them after use. Spraying has been effective, but owing to the extensive underground root system, repeated applications may be necessary. Such weed killers as Stephen and Atlacide, and also Amate, have given good results. The new 2, 4-D weed killers are also useful. The usual precautions as to time and weather conditions apply when using any type weed killer to destroy poison ivy.

TO FIGHT DISEASE

In an effort to control the spread of Foot and Mouth Disease in Mexico and to hasten slaughter and burial of diseased and infected animals, the Mexico-United States Commission for the Eradication of Foot and Mouth Disease has imported hundreds of items of mechanized equipment from the United States—including jeeps, trucks, bulldozers and power shovels. The mobile shops will service the equipment, and this will prevent previous delays which arose when crews of mechanics from the main shops of the Commission in Mexico City had to go to the field to repair immobilized machinery.
