## Pheasant Hunt Is Opposed By Esqueusing Council

### Special Meeting Held August 13th to View Gravel Pit and Damaged Bridge

At the regular meeting of Esqueusing Township Council held on Tuesday evening, September 2nd, the following accounts were passed for payment.

The Municipal World, supplies, \$9.25; Bell Telephone Co., services, \$4.40; Department of Health, insulin, 16c; Province of Saskatchewan, charity account, \$20.00; Acton Fair Board and Esqueusing Agricultural Societies, \$75.00 each; Halton Agricultural Society, \$25.00; Norval Junior Farmers, Grain Club, \$25.00; A. W. Benton, stamps, \$7.00; Canadian General Insurance Company, bond, \$5.00.

Relief accounts for \$41.60 presented by the relief officer, and road expenditures presented by the road superintendent for \$3,297.50 were also passed for payment.

The treasurer was instructed to pay the following sheep claims: J. C. Murray, 1 ewe killed, 1 lamb killed, \$25.00; 1 lamb that had to be killed, \$15.00; 1 lamb injured, \$15.00; A. N. Stark, valuator, \$4.00.

It was decided that C. G. Riddell be paid \$100.00 for moving his crushing equipment from one pit to the other, and that he receive 60 cents per yard for supplying and crushing gravel and mileage rate as per contract.

Council agreed to oppose a pheasant hunt in the township of Esqueusing in the year 1947. A letter from W. O. Brownridge was filed.

The Department of Highways will be petitioned for the road grant on \$29,656.81.

By-law No. 16-47 to assess the School Sections, Union School Sections, Township School Area No. 1 and Chinguacousy West School Area for 1947 was read the required number of times and passed. By-law No. 17-47 to grant permission to borrow money amounting to \$50,000.00 to meet the current expenditure of the township was passed.

All members were present at this meeting and Reeve G. E. Cleave presided. Council is scheduled to meet again on October 6.

In a special meeting held on Wednesday morning, August 13, Mr. Fellows, assistant to the District Municipal Engineer, went with council to Lot 32, Concession 11, to look over a bridge damaged by flood, then to the gravel pit at Limehouse to see the conditions under which the contractor was crushing gravel, before going to council chambers. Council agreed to pay C. G. Riddell 10 cents per yard extra for gravel crushed after August 1st.

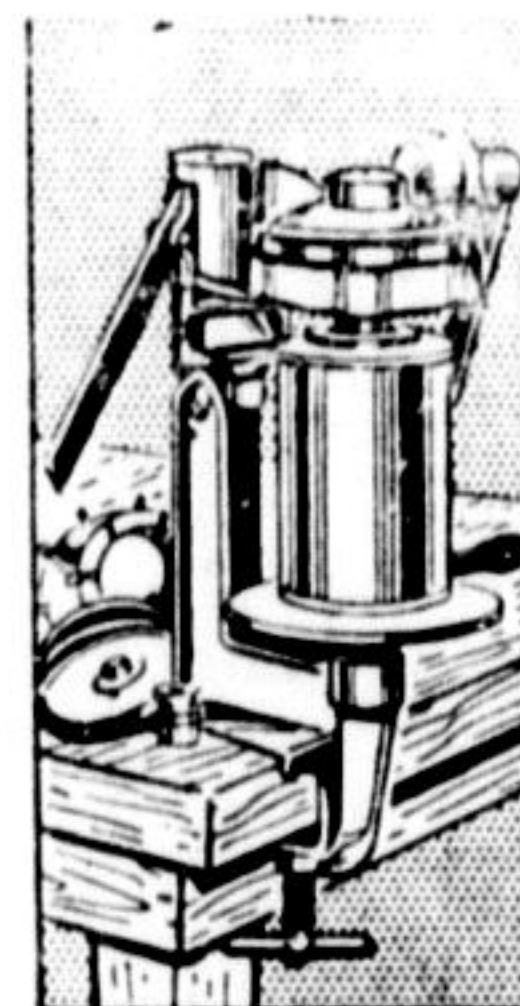

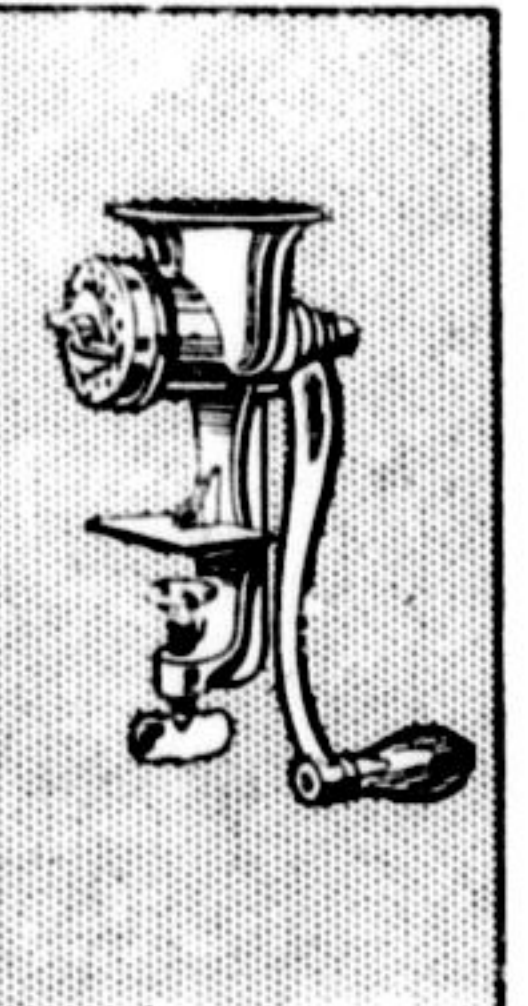
