NEW JET-PROPELLED FIGHTER PLANE FOR BRITAIN'S NAVY

A new fighter aircraft which is being adopted by the Royal Navy has just made its first flight. It is a jet-propelled plane capable of speeds of more than 600 miles an hour which has been designed and built by Hawker Aircraft and is planned for building in two different versions. One will be a land-based plane while the other will be planned to operate from aircraft carriers afloat. Each will have a single Rolls-Royce Nene turbo-jet engine which develops a thrust of 5,000 lbs.

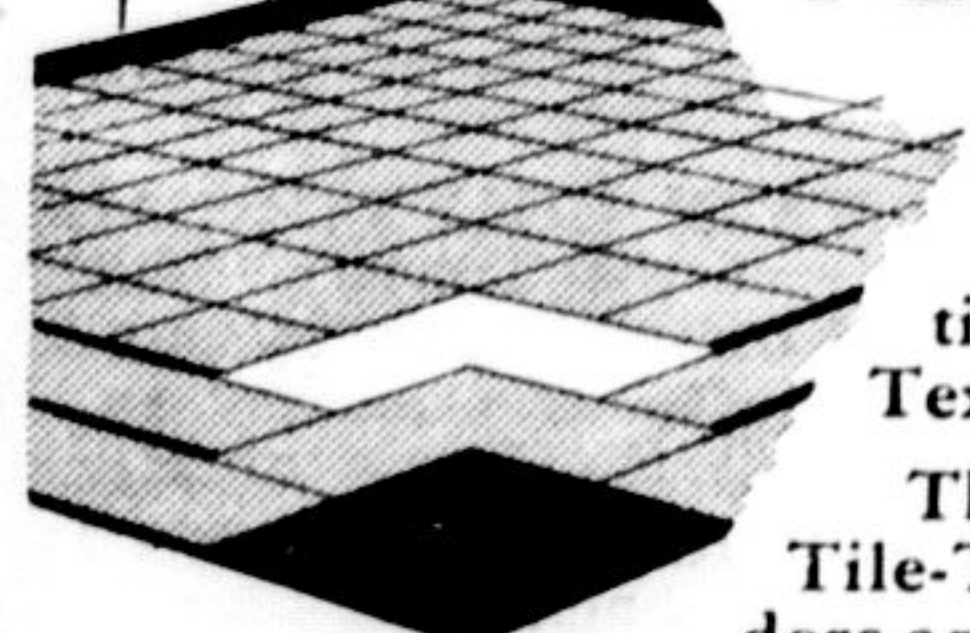
