Farm Machinery

machinery will prove profitable. Though new machinery is easier to Dec. 21st-Special Christmas Services get than during the war years, mary items are still scarce. In view of this and the present high prices for new machinery, it is necessary that the greatest number of useful working hours and the highest degree of efficiency should be obtained from each piece of equipment, says B. F. Tinney, Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

First and foremost in the care and maintenance of equipment is the need of a suitable building where machines may be protected from the weather. No piece of equipment can be kept in good condition if permitted The Young People's Union will hold to remain out of doors during all kinds of weather. Such a building need not be elaborate but it should be tight and dry.

Actual care and maintenance should begin immediately a new machine is put into operation. See that all parts are properly lined up and properly adjusted. Chain drives in particular require correct adjustment and frequent Sunday, Dec. 21st-The Sacrament of attention, or the chain may ride up on the sprocket wheel and be ruined.

Bearings also should be properly tightened-not too tight or they will over heat, not too loose or they will permit the entrance of dirt, or will pound themselves to pieces.

Lubrication is an essential part of every day care and should never be neglected. Good oil and grease cost money but it is still cheaper than replacement parts and will add years to the useful life of a machine. Incidentally, check new machines to see that all oil holes have been properly Wed. 7 p.m.-Junior Choir. drilled and are free from paint. In used machinery, clean sand and dirt from the oil holes and grease cups, so that lubricant may reach the bearings clean and in the proper amount.

During the operating season make note of all items that require attention during the annual overhaul and order replacement parts early. Some replacemnt parts are still exceedingly difficult to procure.

Annual overhaul should be started as soon as possible after the season's work is completed. Machine failures and difficulties are then fresh in the mind of the operator and as a consequence are more likely to receive attention.

HEALTH LAWS

It is just as important for Canadians to know the laws of Nature as the laws of the land, in the opinion of National Health and Welfare ad- And Ye Shall Know the Truth and the visers. Ignorance of the law is no excuse in social offences, and ignorance of health rules leads to punishment as sure as that which Nature metes out to those who offend her wilfully. Public health authorities urge everyone to learn the basic principles of hygiene as outlined in health literature issued free on request through the provincial health departments.

CHILD'S PLAY

Properly conducted competitive sports are essential to development of young people, according to health officers of the Department of National Health and Welfare, Ottawa. Pointing out that organized games will teach youngsters that they are members of society, the Department states that sports show players that others have rights, capacities, ambitions and feelings similar to their own. Health authorities advise parents to encourage children to play with other Thurs. 8 p.m.-Y.P.S. will meet in the youngsters.

MENTAL HEALTH

True happiness, say Ottawa health authorities, calls for more than mere brawn. Brain, too, must be employed. The Department of National Health and Welfare, in a statement, comments on the inter-relations of physical and mental health. No matter how muscular or strong a person, such attributes of mind as self-control and intelligent direction into acceptable activity are required to ensure true well-being.

NORMAL FATIGUE

It is natural to be tired—healthfully fatigued, after an expenditure of energy, and the Department of National Health and Welfare, Ottawa, reminds Canadians that this is part of the process of living. The Department also points out that fatigue produces waste products and that rest and sleep are essential to restoration of body cells. So all must have sufficient sleep for health, with children needing more rest and sleep to compensate for growth and youthful frolics.



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
