Acton Juveniles Win from Milton By 11-5 Score

Sparked by a six goal drive in the third period, Acton Juveniles soundly trounced Milton on Tuesday evening by the score of 11-5. Harold Townsley led the victors with five goals while Mowat performed the hat trick. Kentner, Tyler and Lawson completed the scoring for Acton. For Milton, Keith Fay counted two with Serafini, Timbers and South getting the others.

The first period was quite evenly played, although Acton appeared to hold a slight edge. Townsley opened the scoring and was followed by Serafini. Townsley also drew the only penalty of the period. Both Guild in the Acton nets and Hill for Milton were quite effective.

The second period saw Acton again in control of the puck most of the time but the Milton boys made good use of their breaks and the period ended 5-5. The second frame was a good rushing brand of hockey and there were many close calls around both nets. Bennett and Tyler were the only ones to displease Referee Murray Grenke.

The third frame was almost a rout, for while Acton scored six tallies, Milton was unable to bank one home, largely due to a tight defence and effective goal tending by Guild. There were only two penalties in the third, one to Zajac and one to Kentner, both of Acton. Two "scores" by Milton were disallowed. The first was thrown in by a glove and the second was kicked in by a skate from a scramble in front of the nets.
