timated expenditure for grant purposes.

A by-law was introduced and read the required number of times to provide for expenditures of the Corporation of the Town of Milton for the year 1948. The sum authorized for the authorities to borrow was set at \$50,000.

The Home and School Association requested that the Council flood a rink at the Tennis Courts. No action is to be taken on this request.

A motion was introduced and passed, sponsored by Dick and Norris: "That we petition the Department of Highways for the statutory grant of \$2975.25 for the work done on streets in Town of Milton for the year 1947.

The business tax of Mr. Charles Laudon was cancelled as he was not in business during 1947.

Mr. Elliott enquired for Mr. Hilson about the bill which he had received for the installation of water to his property. Council discussed this arrangement and made a decision on the supplying of water. All those outside the Corporation who do not pay the cost are to have their services disconnected.

The Industrial and Planning Committee were to take up the matter of helping an industry getting established in Milton.

Councillor Dick suggested that Council procure the services of an engineer to lay out a plan to give some continuity to the building of street and walks etc. Council felt something along this line should be done.

Council discussed salaries of certain town officials but this matter was left over for another meeting.

The rate was to be set with the owner of the horses used on the town plow for plowing the side-walks. This matter was to be taken up by Mayor Heslop.

INDICATIONS COFFEE PRICE MAY EASE

Indications in primary coffee markets suggest that an easing in price may develop during the first months of 1948 reports Canadian Grocer.

Wholesale price of roasted and ground coffee increased 2 cents per lb. early in December, marking the fourth rise since decontrol in August. It followed closely the decrease of 1 cent per lb. in the non-British tariff announced Nov. 17. This decrease could not be passed along to the trade and consumers because roasters were at that time facing the possibility of a price increase in primary markets, the grocery business paper explains. The feeling now seems to be gaining ground that primary market prices have about reached their peak.

Planning Committee At Work On Halton County Centre

The Halton County Community Centre, situated along the Twelve Mile Creek at Lowville, will be taking shape as early in the spring as the weather will permit, according to the Committee appointed by the Halton County Federation of Agriculture at the last director's meeting.

This Committee met on the Community Centre Grounds, made a complete survey and then adjourned to R. Heatherington's home and sat down to plan a program of development for 1948.

Last fall several bees were held to clean and clear the park and grounds through the co-operation of farmers from all over the county. Seventy-five or eighty per cent. of this work was done and the committee now recommend that this work be completed as early in the spring as possible in order to take advantage of the kindly and liberal offers of the municipalities to send in their road machinery to do the leveling and grading of the grounds. It was also reported to the committee that one or two individuals who owned this large type machinery had offered to bring their machines along and assist in this work. Adding these offers together the committee feel assured that all this work may be done at little or no capital expenditure.

The committee visualize the developments to be such in the next few years to provide picnic tables and benches, pavilion with kitchen, wash rooms, running water, foot bridge over the creek, hydro accommodations, illuminated ball diamonds, community hall and all that goes to provide healthy accommodations for all types of recreation. Such a program of development will take considerable money but the committee were unanimously agreed that the development will proceed only as the money is made available and to provide a plan to raise such funds another committee were appointed to draft a plan for the raising of a sufficient amount of money to carry out a moderate program of development for 1948. Many individuals and organizations have been inquiring as to the method of collecting money for this work. It is felt that even if only \$2500 are made available this spring, the grounds could be put into shape and accommodations provided in sufficient time to make the community centre really useful this coming summer.

The work of this committee has only commenced, smaller committees were given specific work to do and all are to report to the directors and submit cost estimates and possible agreements, etc., at the next meeting. The committee reports it has been most gratifying to hear so many of the citizens of our county town expressing their approval and congratulations to the Federation of Agriculture for the bringing about and making possible a community centre for Halton County.

It will only be a matter of a very few years until every county in Ontario will have a community centre of their own. Several counties are active in this regard at present. It is with some pride that many Halton people say good old Halton is leading again.
