PICK MILTON LAD TO MAKE BIG TIME HOCKEY

of the year in the National League and Bruce Burdett, later an Indianapolis team mate. He went to Detroit's training camp in the fall of '46 and won a job with Indianapolis. Playing most of the season with veterans at center and right wing beside him, the rookie scored 20 goals and 14 assists for 34 points. He may double that output this season.

Last summer he returned to the railroad section gang with which he first worked in the summer of '46, after receiving a shoulder injury at Stratford. Seliz went with the gang the first summer to strengthen the shoulder. Now it's strong and the work had made the rest of him a "mass of muscle" not muscle-bound but hard and durable.

He found the pro game much rougher than "amateur" hockey. His first pro coach, Tommy Ivan, told him last year, "If you don't do anything else out there, hit someone."

Seliz found that a good policy, he says, "If you go out and hit 'em the first period, somebody will weaken and you just figure it won't be you. Hockey games are decided in the third period and if you're stronger in the third period, you'll win most of the time."

He frequently can be located skating some distance across the ice to check some of the enthusiasm out of an opponent and he is not likely to qualify for any most gentlemanly awards, solely because of his generous amount of penalty time.

No matter how far he goes, Seliz will never forget a home-town friend named Walt Hayward, who coached him in junior play. Hayward never played hockey but he was a great pal to the kids of Milton and he and his wife the team's most ardent booster, made a lasting impression with their kindness.

Seliz is the middle one of three children, one of his sisters being older, the other younger. Some of the family came to see him play the last time Indianapolis was in Buffalo and he treated them with what many of the other Caps believe was his best game of the year.

His road room mate and confidant is Lee Fogolin, a first year defenseman with the Caps, against whom he played in a junior league. Any matters not meant for the unsympathetic ears of their companions, these two talk over in Italian.

He stands a better chance than several rivals to crash the A.L.'s star team just because he is such a good road player. The voting is limited to players not on the voters' team and that means that most of the ballots will be based on the road playing of the candidates.

Detroit is much more in need of right wingers than left wingers but the Wings no doubt will have no compunctions about using a left handed shot along the right boards if Seliz can carry over his 1947-48 Indianapolis performance training time next September.
