TRAINING HOSPITALS UNDER NEW HEALTH ACT

Fifty of Britain's hospitals are to be set aside for teaching purposes under the National Health Act. Each hospital will provide special facilities for training and research for medical and dental students.

GROW MORE WHEAT

Western Canada should increase its wheat acreage, in the opinion of a majority of Canadians answering a Financial Post questionnaire. Some urged production of as much wheat as possible, in order to provide food for needy nations, and as a bulwark against future emergencies at home. Others favored "cautious and controlled" increase in acreage. A minority saw danger in over-sowing of wheat, and in disturbing the present balance between wheat and coarse grains. One or two called for restoration of a free market in grain, and argued that farmers could then solve the question for themselves. Statistics show Canada's wheat acreage in 1939, the last prewar year, at 26 million acres; in 1943, 16.9 million acres; 1944, 23.3 millions; 1945, 23.4 millions; 1946, 23.7 millions, 1947, 23.4.
