Darby, of the Ontario Provincial Police gave an interesting talk on safety; C. Marritt, Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, told them the value of reforestration in the county; while W. I. Dick, K.C., and Crown Attorney for Halton, outlined the functions of justice, advising the boys and girls to keep out of trouble, and they would never have to fear his department, whose duty it is to assist every citizen. Dr. James Mather outlined the value of the Health Unit and it's work in our municipality.

L. L. Skuce, Public School Inspector addressed the pupils at the luncheon, held at the United Church. He emphasized to the children the shoals and rocks they would encounter during their voyage on the sea of life, referring to seven guides which he felt would help them to pass the danger zones safely.
