Farm Tractors Can Originate Fires

With the more general use on farms of tractors, trucks and gasoline driven machinery, care is needed to see that this type of equipment does not become a potential source of farm fires.

Speaking before the 1947 Convention of the Mutual Fire Underwriters' Association of Ontario, the companies of which carry about 75 per cent. of all fire insurance on agricultural property in Ontario, Mr. C. W. Caskey, Solicitor to the Ontario Fire Marshal's office emphasized the possible fire danger from farm tractors and trucks. Pointing out that automotive engineers have designed trucks and tractors so that the least possible fire hazard exists, so long as the equipment is kept in good running order, Mr. Caskey said that most fires originating from gasoline-driven vehicles can be traced to one of the following: Poor Maintenance—The important items are mufflers, gasoline lines, carburetors and the ignition system. Trouble rarely comes suddenly and there are usually warnings of defects which can be detected in advance.

Improper refueling and imperfect storage—Small quantities of gasoline if required should be carried in safety cans only, and motor should be stopped, manifold and muffler be reasonably cool and no smoking, while tank is being filled.

Accumulations of dust, oil and combustible material—A load of grain passing the muffler too close may take fire, straw or chaff may blow to accumulate on the engine, clog the radiator, pile up on the muffler build up around the tractor or truck to provide direct contact with heated parts or get close enough for sparks to ignite.

Poor judgment in operating the equipment or unexpected accident—Tractors and trucks being driven in and around farm buildings should be handled with the same care and good judgment given to driving a car on a crowded highway. The slightest accident—if burning gasoline is involved—can cause a disastrous fire.

BAD GUESSERS

The democracies have been notoriously bad guessers when it comes to deciding the probabilities of peace or war. We've missed out twice, and we may miss out again, but at least the third time we oughtn't to be caught flatfooted. One of the troubles with us is that we don't want to waste a lot

of money in preparing for an eventuality that may never arise. The trouble is that in trying to wait it out we are at a sharp disadvantage. Joe Stalin doesn't have to ask the County Council, or the people or the parliament what he shall do. He tells them. That way is a lot quicker than ours. As Secretary Marshall of the United States said recently, "Experience has proved that the democracies once aroused to concerted action, possess the material and spiritual strength to overcome this advantage. But," he warned, "a late awakening to danger and failure to act promptly adds immeasurably to the cost of ultimate success."

We guessed wrong that the Kaiser's Germany didn't really want war. We guessed that Hitler wouldn't push matters too far and were wrong again. Guessing that Stalin might, we could very possibly be wrong again. But we will be a lot better to prepare for that one and waste our preparations in peace, than to take the chance and pay the dreadful costs for guessing right and doing nothing about it.

16. Chairman of local National Clothing Collection for War Ravaged Countries.
17. Present Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Oakville-Trafalgar High School Area Board.
