THE PROGRESSIVE TOWN

Towns are often urged to be progressive, and to keep up with modern ideas. The question may be asked, as to what a town has to do in order to be rated as progressive. The spirit of progress might be defined as a desire to keep up with modern times, and to keep making improvements, in so far as these may be practical considering the resources and size of the community. New projects might be suggested that would be admirable for a community if they could be afforded, but which would be too costly for many communities.

Good practical judgment says that people should not be satisfied with things just as they were in the old days, and should be looking for gains and improvements that are reasonably within their reach.

PRACTICAL JUDGMENT

Practical judgment is a highly valuable quality, and the question may be asked as to how it can be developed. It seems to be very helpful in developing it, if people have human contacts. If they meet many persons in work and business and social life, if they exchange ideas with the people they meet and with friends and neighbors, if they talk over questions of conduct and work and daily life and community affairs and national policy they are likely to develop good judgment about life and affairs.

They hear all sides of many questions, and are likely to form practical ideas. Their judgment is very valuable in their occupations and community life.

OBTAINING JOBS

As young people approach the close of their school and college terms, many of them are looking for employment for the summer. A good many are finishing their education and will be ready to go to work permanently. Some may be asking what they can do to give a favourable impression as they look for jobs.

A good or excellent record in their school or college work goes a long way to help them. When they have done their study tasks well, it is a sign they will go well in whatever they undertake. The work they have done in any former jobs they held will also help them. The young people of today give a very favourable impression as they look for work, and one can believe they will all find good opportunities.

Skunk Feasts On Turtles Eggs

Driving along the causeway at Long Point, Lake Erie, at dusk a Toronto amateur naturalist stopped his car to watch a turtle 20 feet away in a sand pocket, solemnly attending to her egg-laying function. Directly behind her a handsome skunk awaited the dinner gong with philosophic patience. The gong did not sound during the intrusion by human eyes, but noting the pine-enclosed sand pocket carefully, the naturalist returned an hour later. Turtle and skunk alike had departed, and broken egg shells were the only relics to tell of the skunk's feast on strictly fresh eggs. On the same Long Point trip the observer found turtles especially numerous. Snapping turtles and spotted turtles were seen; painted map and Blanding's turtles, and only the soft shell species failed to join the parade on the sandy beaches. There is a fascinating display of turtles of Ontario within the Royal Ontario Museum, and it was from a study of that exhibit that the observer mentioned found the identification of the species he saw much simplified. It is not unusual to find as many as 30 or 40 eggs in the rudimentary "nest" of a turtle.

CONSUMPTION MILK, CHEESE INCREASED IN AUSTRALIA, N.Z.

Consumption of fluid milk has increased noticeably over pre-war years both in Australia and in New Zealand. In Australia, at 230 pints per person in 1946-47, consumption has increased by 22 per cent, and in New Zealand at 305 pints per person in 1946, it was nearly 39 per cent above the pre-war years 1934-38. Cheese consumption has also increased in both countries Australia by nearly 39 per cent and New Zealand by 31 per cent.

On the other hand, butter consumption has declined by 23 per cent in Australia and by nearly 27 per cent in New Zealand. However, to provide butter for export to Great Britain this dairy product is still rationed in both countries, six ounces per person weekly being the ration in Australia and eight ounces in New Zealand. Fluid cream too, is only supplied on doctors' orders.

These restrictions on butter and cream may be in part the cause for the increased consumption of fluid milk and cheese, but full employment and increased family purchasing power are naturally a pre-requisite for a swing from one product to another.
