NEW DOMESTIC HEATING TEST APPARATUS

A four-storied scientific apparatus 40 feet high—designed to ensure that domestic heating appliances give their maximum efficiency-is now complete at the Government Fuel Research Station, Greenwich, (London). Called the "calorimeter" building, it is the only one of its kind in the world. 
