REFRIGERATORS SCARCER

"Still looking for a new refrigerator?", asks The Financial Post. It's likely you'll have to look harder yet in coming months. But the big manufacturers say you won't be digging any deeper into your pocketbook as the current increase of \$9.34 per ton in steel price was covered by a 7% 8% hike per refrigerator about two weeks ago.

A drastic reduction of from 35% to 40% in output of electric refrigerators for domestic sale in the balance of 1948, new layoffs in employment, are forecast by some of Canada's manufacturers, The Financial Post learns.

There appears to be little chance of improved supplies reaching dealers in the immediate future. At present there are reported to be precious few units for sale, regardless of price.

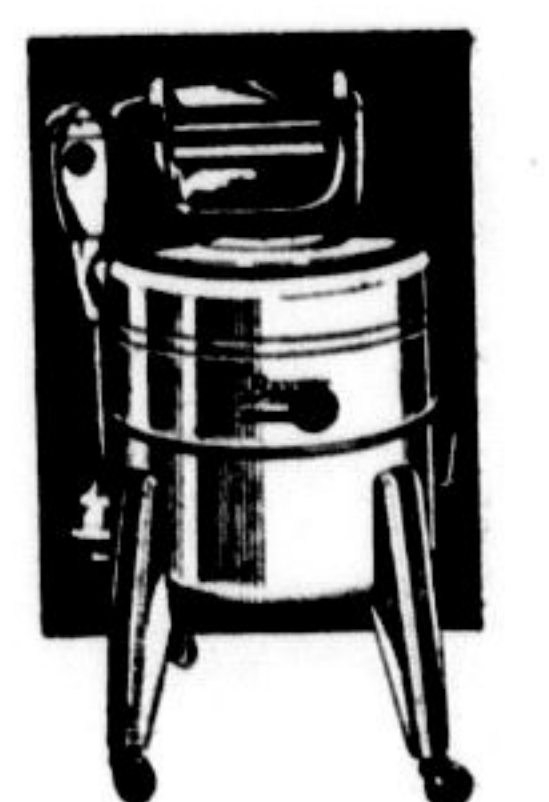
