MILLIONS FROM TOURISTS

Good Labor Day weather and a continued steady flow of U.S. visitors to Canada since are expected to boost Canada's tourist trade balance sheet to a new high for 1948, a Financial Post report says.

Accurate estimates won't be available for some time yet, but a preliminary check suggests that a record figure of \$275 millions for U.S. tourist expenditure is not an impossibility. This would be 17% above the previous 1947 record of \$235 millions; would compare with \$184 millions estimated as spent by U.S. tourists in Canada in the boom year of 1929.

WORLD SUPPLY OF RED CLOVER SHORT

According to information released by the International Emergency Food Committee, Washington, D.C., the world supply of red clover seed continues to be less than requirements.

In view of this situation, it is anticipated that supplies of Canadian red clover seed, surplus to domestic needs, will be in demand and consequently every effort should be made to harvest as much seed as possible.

U.S. DEMAND IS FOR HIGH QUALITY BEEF CATTLE

Since the ban on the export of beef cattle to U.S. was removed a few weeks ago, we have been impressed by the fact that U.S. buyers are interested only in high quality beef cattle or perhaps we should say they are only prepared to pay top prices for good cattle while the price of the common stuff remains at much the same figure it commanded previous to the embargo being removed. In conversation with one of the members of the Ontario Agricultural Commission of Inquiry which sat some three or four years ago, we were told that the members of the Commission were unanimous in realizing that the average quality of our Ontario beef cattle is not good enough but they were more or less at a loss to suggest any new method of improvement. We can't help but wonder if the price spread which now exists between the price of top cattle and that for common stuff will not succeed where propaganda, bull bonuses, etc. failed in the past. We are informed that top butcher cattle sold on the Toronto market at 27c for export while some of the common stuff sold as low as 15c. That spread should encourage the investment in top beef herd sires.

CANADIAN TOY FIRM SETS UP U.S. BRANCH PLANT

A Western Ontario toy manufacturer has recently established an assembly plant in the United States in order to develop his market south of the border. All the manufacturing is done in Canada, but the parts are assembled, painted and shipped from the new plant. In this way, the company is able to sell its products at a price satisfactory to United States customers.

BUTTER FAMINE FADES

Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe and his Department of Trade and Commerce world-wide organization of trade commissioners started negotiations in Denmark, New Zealand and wherever they could sniff out a few million surplus pounds. Now the word is that all Canada's deficit is being looked after.

Just what the deficit will be, is anyone's guess. But a recent estimate indicates that it won't be as large as present supply figures indicate. The reason: there has probably been quite a bit of hoarding. That means we may get by with importing about 15 million lbs. rather than 25 million lbs.
