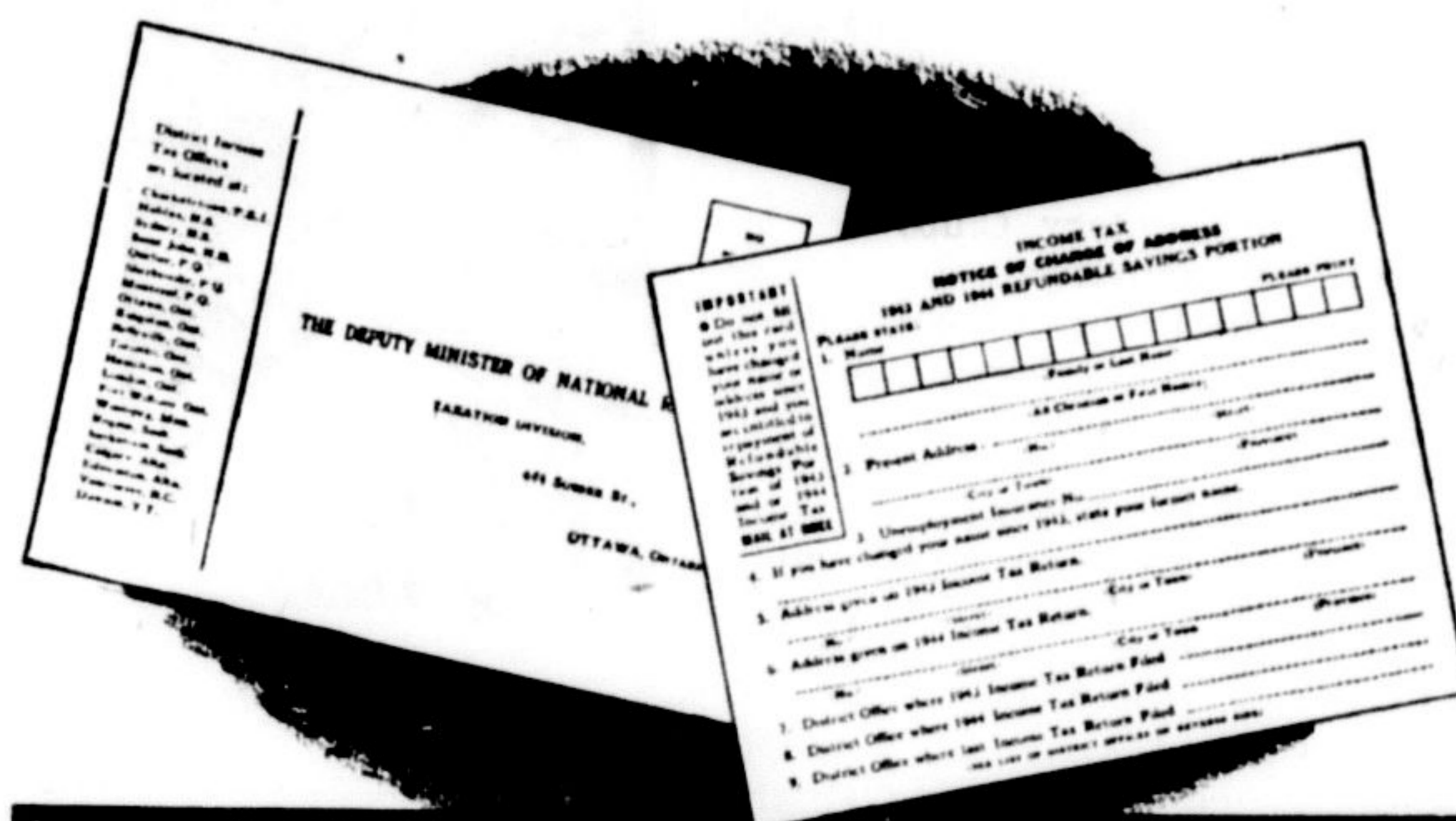

NEWS and VIEWS

Of Halton Farm Interest

Editor of Farmers' Advocate to Address Halton Meeting

Halton County Council in recent years has purchased 700 acres of land in the County for Reforestation purposes. Most of this acreage has now been planted and the earlier plantations are worthy of a visit. In addition, under the leadership of the Agricultural and Reforestation Committee of the County Council, Inspector Skuce, teachers, trustees and ratepayers, an inter-school tree planting competition was inaugurated last spring. Some fine rural schools each planted an acreage in their respective school sections, and the awards will be announced in the near future. Halton County Council is now giving consideration to paying a subsidy to property owners who will fence and protect existing woodlots from livestock. In brief, the Agricultural and Reforestation Committee of Halton County Council has become seized by the importance of soil, water and tree conservation and their relationship to food production.

Streams which 25 or 30 years ago ran all year round, today are dry most of the year. Farmers' wells which a few years ago never dried up, are today often dry for months. In addition, fish and other game have greatly decreased in number because of loss of trees and streams not to mention the loss of fertile soil as a result of flooding and run-off.

In order that all Halton ratepayers, both urban and rural, may discuss this problem, a public meeting is to be held in the Court House, Milton, on Tuesday, October 26th at 8:00 p.m. Reeve Alex. MacLaren, chairman of the Halton Reforestation and Agriculture committee, informs us he has been successful in securing as guest speaker, Watson H. Porter, Editor-in-chief of the Farmers' Advocate and secretary of the Ontario Conservation and Reforestation Committee. Mr. Porter in recent years has visited Europe and is familiar with measures adopted by many countries to meet similar problems to those which exist in Halton. The writer has heard Mr. Porter speak on many occasions and we can assure our readers that a trip to Milton on October 26th will be more than worth while.

Halton Breeders Make Outstanding Showing at Simcoe

The Championship Shows for Central and Western Ontario Jerseys and Guernseys were held at Simcoe on Tuesday and Thursday respectively last week. In the Jersey Show which brought together over 200 top Jerseys of central and western Ontario, Halton was represented by only one herd, namely that of M. C. Beaty of Milton. What a clean-up that lone Halton herd made. A few of the more noteworthy wins follow:

The Beaty senior herd sire, Brampton Basil Ward was the senior and grand champion bull of the show. Even more outstanding

was the showing of Basil Ward's Get. A junior yearling daughter won her class and went on to the Junior Championship and reserve grand championship of the show. Still another daughter was the first prize heifer calf and reserve junior champion female. His offspring also won the progeny of dam class, junior get-of-sire class, and to climax it all Basil Ward and a group of his daughters won the Graded Herd Class. It has been many a year since a Halton herd of any breed has made such an outstanding showing at one of the major shows.

Halton County may well be proud of the honors brought to the County by the Beaty herd. Few breeders achieve such honors in a lifetime, but to build up a herd of this quality in a period of some eleven years is little short of amazing. Were such an achievement to take place in the field of sport, headlines would blaze across the front page of every newspaper in Ontario, but as this was in the field of Agriculture, all we can apparently say is hats off to Maurice Beaty and those associated with him—we're proud of the achievement and we extend heartiest congratulations on a job well done.

Besides Jerseys, Lazy Pat Farms, Palermo made the Guernsey enthusiasts of central and western Ontario sit up and take notice. Perhaps the most noteworthy achievement among other wins was the Senior and Grand Championship award on their herd sire, Kingsholm Philosopher which animal also won similar honors at the Halton Guernsey Show recently. This animal was bred by Geo. H. King & Sons, Oakville, and to Messrs. Piggot and King we also extend our sincere congratulations.
