### TOWNSHIP OF TRAFALGAR MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Construction of and Equipping a Hospital in Oakville to be known as the Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital

VOTING ON THE QUESTION IN RELATION TO THE TOWNSHIP OF TRAFALGAR RAISING \$500,000 BY SALE OF DEBENTURES TO ERRECT AND EQUIP A HOSPITAL IN OAKVILLE

Notice is hereby given that the votes of the Electors ENTITLED TO VOTE ON MONEY BY-LAWS will be taken at the Municipal Elections to be held on MONDAY, the 6TH DAY OF DECEMBER, 1948 on the following question (which is correctly stated, viz: "Are you in favor of providing the Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital Board with \$500,000 for the purpose of erecting and equipping a Hospital in the Town of Oakville, and to the issue of Debentures to cover cost of same, said hospital to be known as the Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital.")

Each Elector is Entitled to Vote on Said Question in Each Ward in Which He or She has the Right to Vote on Money By-Laws.

A tenant who has a lease which extends for a period of at least twenty-one years and who has, by such lease, covenanted to pay all municipal taxes in respect of the property leased (other than local improvement rates) shall, if he or she makes and FILES WITH THE CLERK OF THE MUNICIPALITY NOT LATER THAN THE 26th DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1948, BEING A DATE NOT LATER than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote, a declaration under "The Canada Evidence Act" so stating, be entitled to have his or her name entered on the list of Electors to vote on the said question.

A CORPORATION assessed on the last revised assessment as owner or as lessee, having a lease for a period of at least twenty-one years, shall be entitled to appoint a nominee to vote on its behalf on this question. All such appointments must be in writing and filed with the Clerk of the Municipality not later than the 26th day of November, 1948, BEING A DATE NOT LATER than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote. When a corporation is a lessee, a declaration in accordance with the preceding paragraph, must also be filed.

A list of all voters entitled to vote on the above question has been prepared and may be inspected at the Clerk's Office after November 15th, between the hours of 9.30 a.m. and 4.30 p.m., excepting Saturdays and Sundays.

Notice is further given that the 29th day of November, 1948, at hour of 3 o'clock in the afternoon at the Clerk's Office at Trafalgar, is the time and place which has been fixed for the appointment of persons to attend at the various polling places and at the final summing-up of the votes, on the 8th day of December, 1948, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon by the Township Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in voting in the affirmative or negative on this question.

### No Criminal Cases in Halton Fall Assizes

Myrtle B. Field, owner of the dog which allegedly attacked the plaintiff causing injury to plaintiff's leg when bitten.

According to the testimony of Mrs. Wheeler she had taken her small dog for a walk on the night of March 9, 1946, when she was attacked. She told the court she was carrying her dog when the defendant's dog ran from the house, jumped at her back and knocked her to the ground in front of Miss Field's residence. "The dog pulled my gosh and shoe off, grabbed me by the leg tearing three holes in the flesh above the ankle. It then grabbed my left arm as Miss Field came out and pried the dog's mouth open to release it", witness testified, adding she was under medical care for eight weeks.

"The same dog attacked me nine years previously but did not bite me on that occasion. Later it bit my niece who was seven years of age then."

Under cross examination by L. Dingle witness said every time Miss Field's dog saw her little Pekinese dog it would go after it.

William Anderson, former deputy sheriff and Mrs. Frank McNiven both testified the dog had jumped at them on occasion. Miss Ethel Brass, niece of Mrs. Wheeler, described how she was playing on her aunt's lawn when the dog grabbed her on the arm.

Taking the stand in her own defense, Miss Field denied her dog was of vicious nature. She admitted it had attacked the smaller dog but did not know that Mrs. Wheeler's niece was bitten until 1946 when the writ was issued. She also testified she had never received any complaints about her pet, but those from the Wheeler family.

Describing the events on the night of March 9, 1946, witness said she heard a scream and found that her dog had hold of Mrs. Wheeler's coat sleeve. "She was sitting on the sidewalk but she did not say she had been bitten. I did not know until the following Monday when her husband called me at the officer", Miss Field testified.

Dr. C. H. Heslop said the dog had no vicious characteristics to his knowledge and he destroyed the animal in April 1946. Thos. Deane appeared for the plaintiff.

Dr. Floyd Bridgeman, veterinary said that terriers as a type are not a vicious animal, but at times become excitable.

Three divorce actions were heard Tuesday and decree nisi was granted in each case. They were Taylor vs Taylor, the custody of three children was granted to the plaintiff; Busby vs Busby; Gray vs Gray; and Smith vs Smith.

At the opening of the assizes Crown Attorney W. I. Dick advised His Lordship there were no criminal cases to be heard.

"That is very good news, indeed. I congratulate the county of Halton as an exception, by not having criminal actions at this time. No doubt the county does have criminal cases but you are fortunate in not having those of major nature", Mr. Justice Genest observed.

Deputy Sheriff E. E. Yates presented His Lordship with the customary white gloves.

One non-jury civil action, McGhee vs Culp arising from a motor accident began yesterday.

### TORONTO PHILHARMONIC CHOIR PRESENTS FIRST CONCERT SOON

On Thursday the 18th of November, the Toronto Philharmonic Choir will give its first concert for the season in the Massey Hall, Toronto. The choir under the direction of Mr. Robert S. Hatley, will have a rather unique program consisting of choral arrangements by Fred Waring, folk songs, Spirituals, sea songs, Irish songs and some nonsense numbers.

Miss Patsy Parr, eleven year old prodigy, will play some well-known piano numbers and also some of her own compositions.

One half hour broadcast of the program will be made over station CJBC, 9.30 to 10.00 p.m. We understand several Milton music lovers will make the trip for this performance.

### INCREASED DEMAND FOR TELEPHONES

In less than three years, the number of telephones in Britain has increased by over 50 per cent. On March 31, Britain had 4,652,704 stations and of these 1,665,564 had been provided since VJ Day. This is all the more surprising considering the inevitable shortage of telephones throughout the world due to the war. During the year April 1947 to March 1948, the number of new telephones installed by the United Kingdom Post Office authorities amounted to 606,000.

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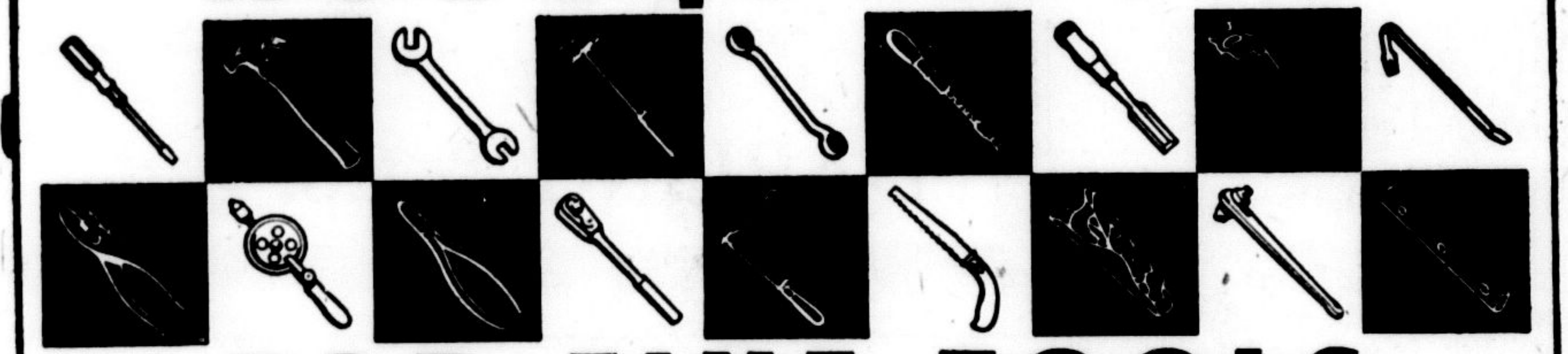

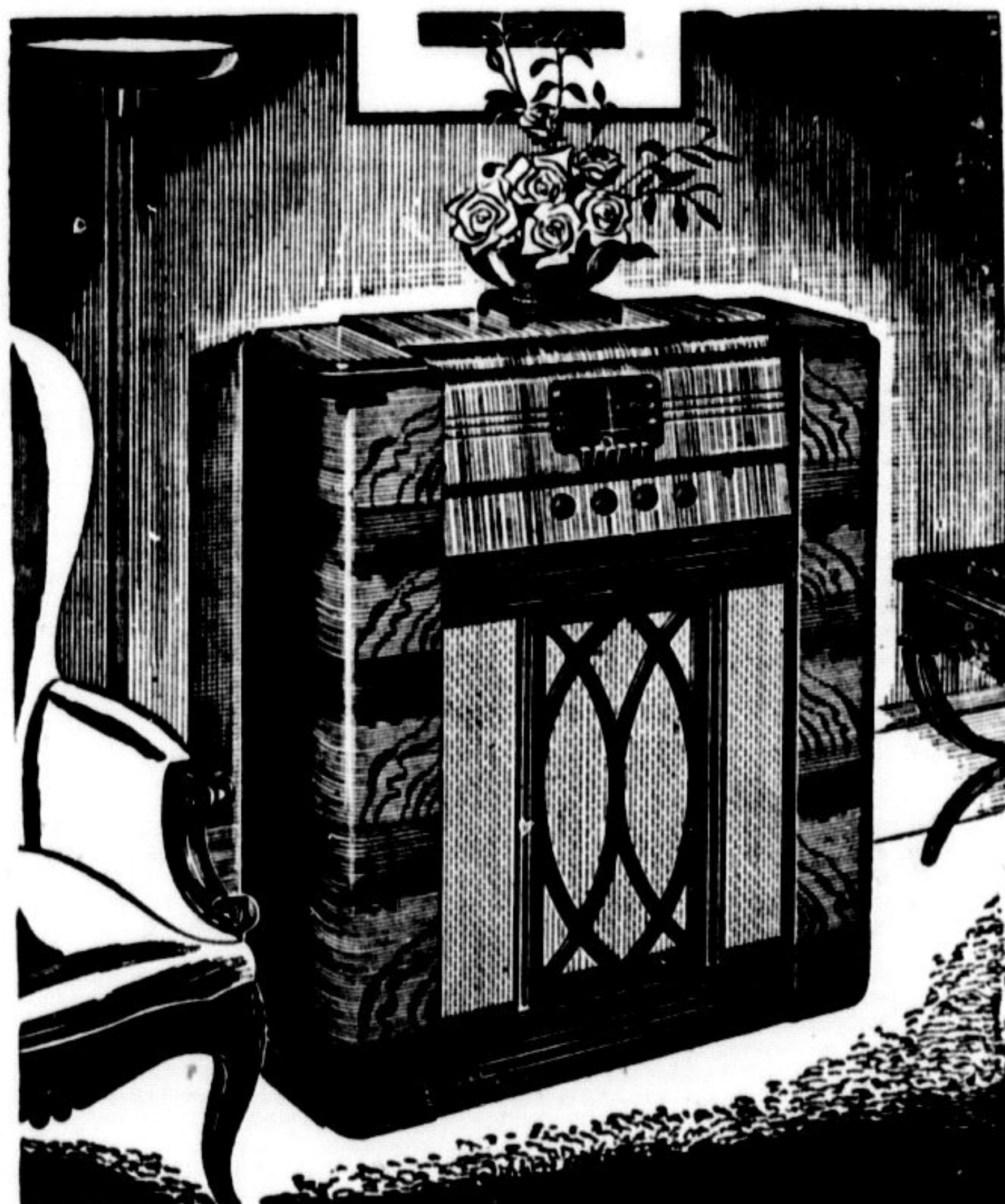

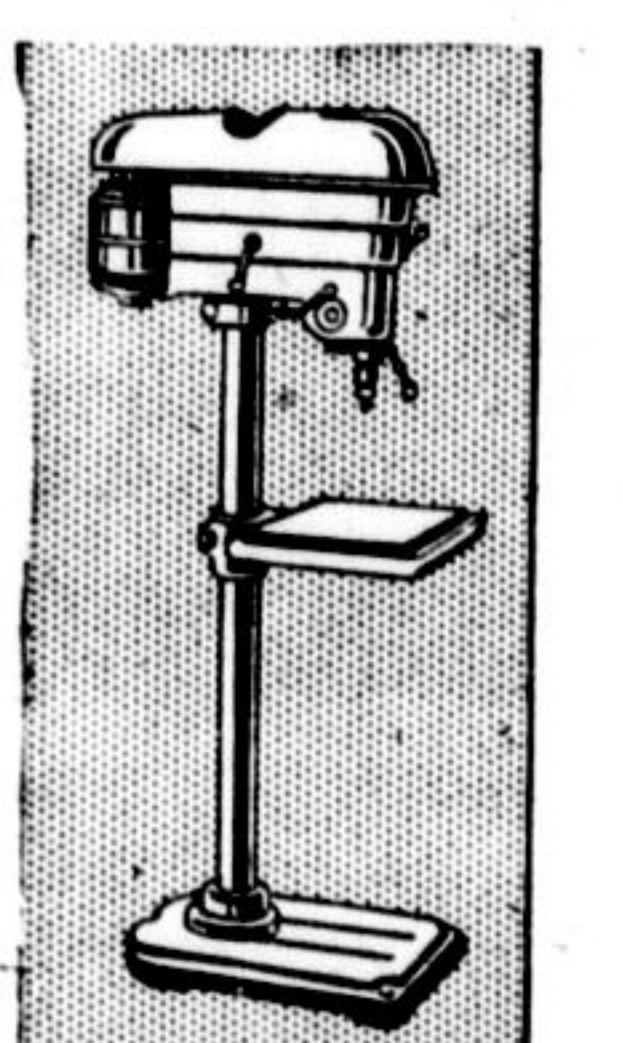
