

According to the testimony of Mrs. Wheeler she had taken her small dog for a walk on the night of March 9, 1946, when she was at tacked. She told the court she was carrying her dog when the defendant's dog ran from the house, jumped at her back and knocked her to the ground in front of Miss Field's residence. "The dog pulled IN RELATION TO THE TOWN- my golosh and shoe off, grabbed me SHIP OF TRAFALGAR RAISING by the leg tearing three holes in the flesh above the ankle. It then grabbed my left arm as Miss Field came out and pried the dog's mouth open to release it", witness testified, adding she was under medical care for eight weeks.

"The same dog attacked me nine years previously but did not bite me on that occasion. Later it bit my niece who was seven years of age then."

Under cross examination by L. Dingle witness said every time Miss Field's dog saw her little Pekinese dog it would go affter it.




