1946 Biggest Year For Bear Bounty

There were 750 claims for bear bounty in Ontario in 1950 according to the Annual Report of the Department of Lands and Forests. All but 11 of these were found to be in order, and a total of \$9,530 was paid in bounty.

Figures for a five-year period show that in 1946, which was a peak year, 1,167 adult bears were killed, with the Province paying \$11,330 in bounties. In 1947 the number of bears killed upon which bounty was paid dropped slightly to 1,023 representing 959 adults and 73 cubs. The following year, 1948, showed a sharp drop to 569 adults and 17 cubs. In 1949 the figures were 592 adults and 67 cubs.

Last year the statistics showed a marked increase over the two previous years, the figures being 803 adults and 122 cubs.

Forester, Guelph; and seven sons, Bob and William of Acton; Roland, of Ormstown, P.Q.; John, Norman, Earl and Neil of Guelph. The funeral service was on Wednesday, January 2nd. Interment was in Woodlawn Cemetery.

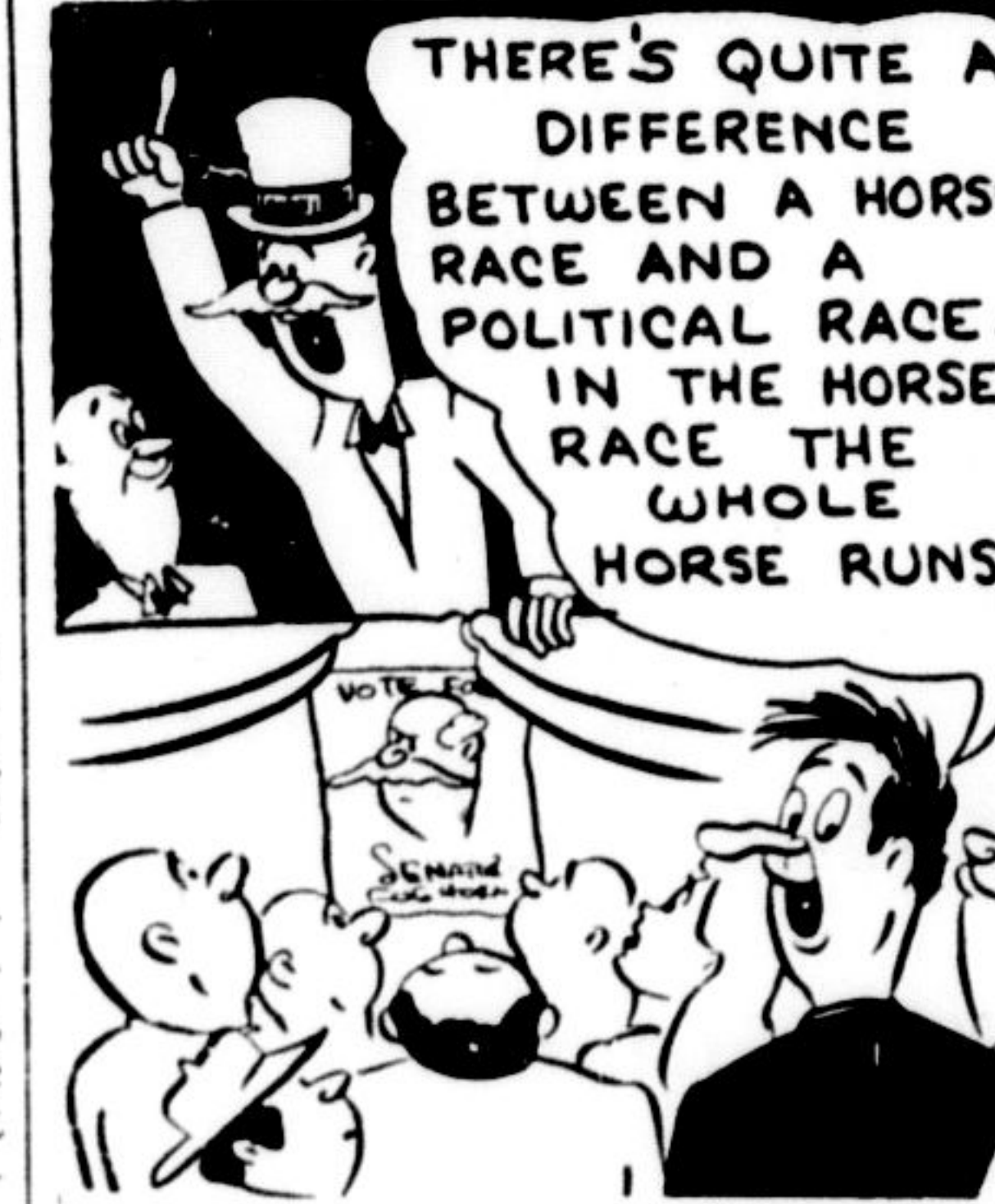

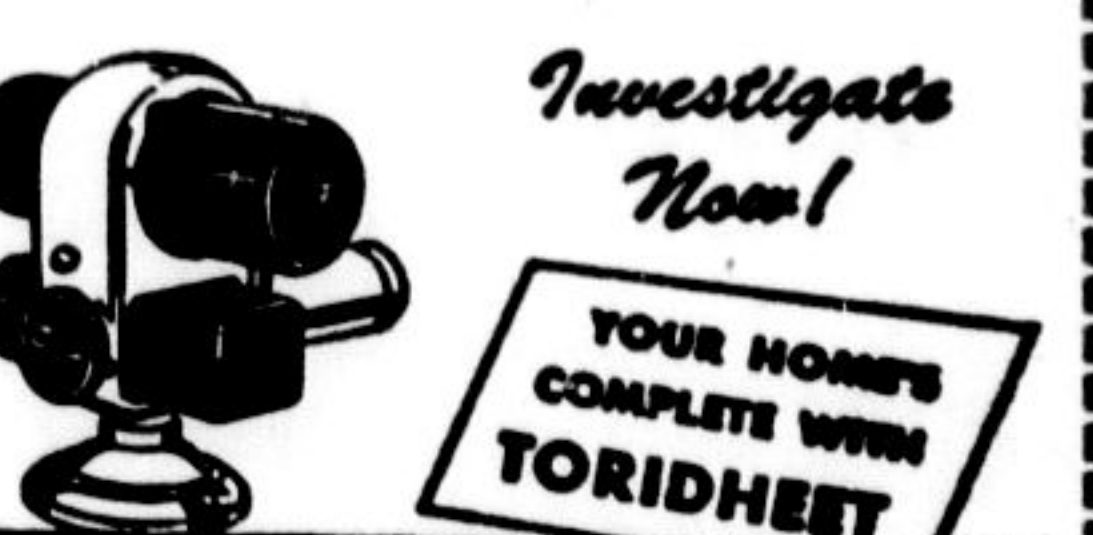
