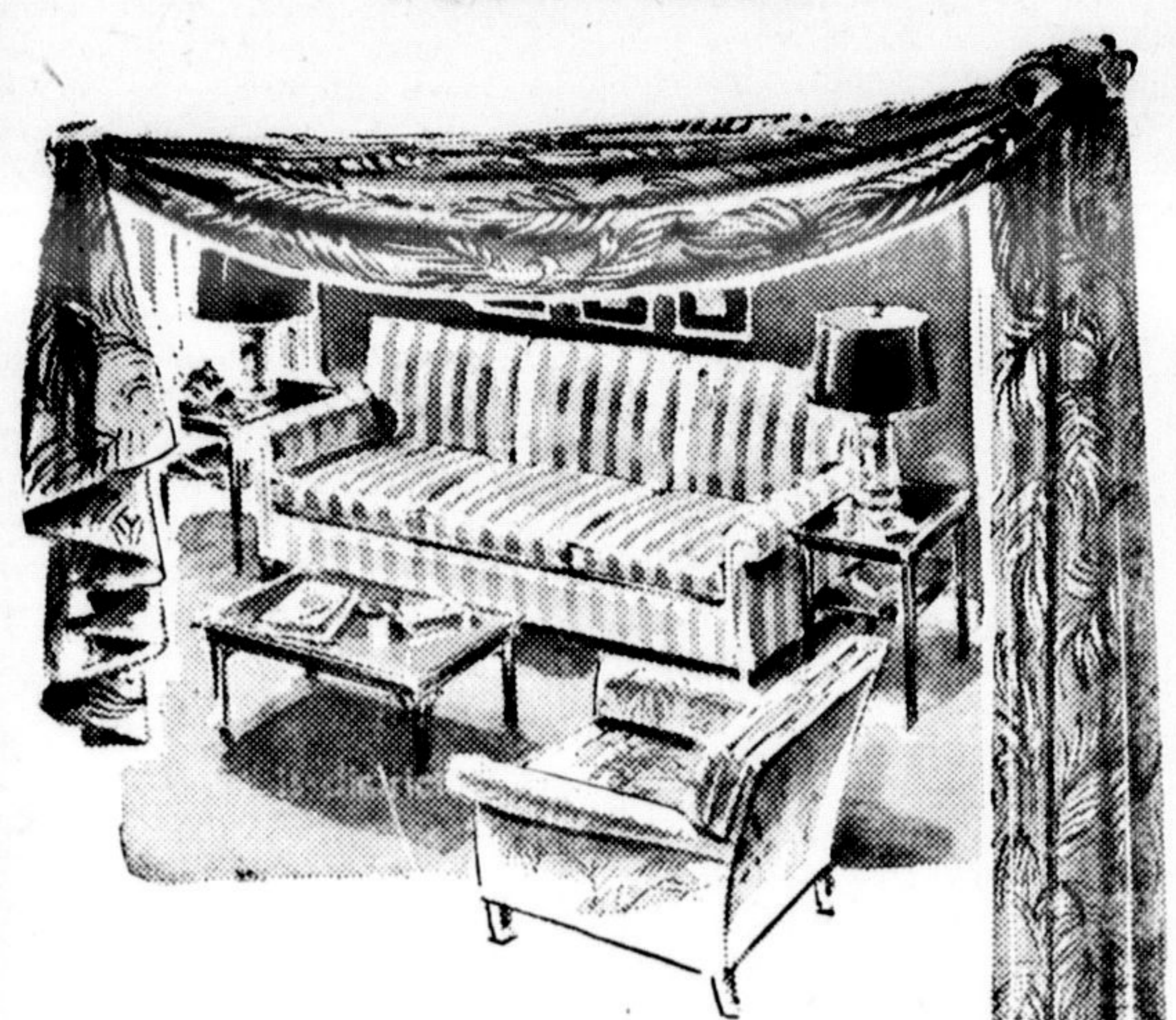
GOT START IN SCOUT SHOW
