WOMAN DIGS IN JERICHO
A season's digging on the site of

PERSONAL LIBERTY
John Stuart Mill, the great Eng-
lish philosopher, writing on the
subject of liberty, spoke of the
need for protection against "the
tyranny of prevailing opinion and
feeling." "There is a limit," he
said, "to the legitimate interference

vidual independence; and to find that
limit, and maintain it against en-
