

LOCAL CLUB DROPS TWO GAMES ON ATTACKS BY PORT CREDIT NINE

Milton went down to two defeats at the hands of the improved Port Credit nine in this week's activity. Saturday, here, the Ports shaded the locals 5-4 on a 12 hit assault on Tasker and Ken Gervais and Tuesday in a twilight game on their own bailiwick the Ports trounced the Red Caps 7-2 behind the gill-edged four hit pitching of F. Milne.

With only two games remaining in the schedule the Milton club is still ahead in the win column. To date they have chalked up ten wins against eight losses and both remaining games, with Campbellville and Waterdown, are scheduled for Milton.

Port Credit, a much improved club over their showing at the last

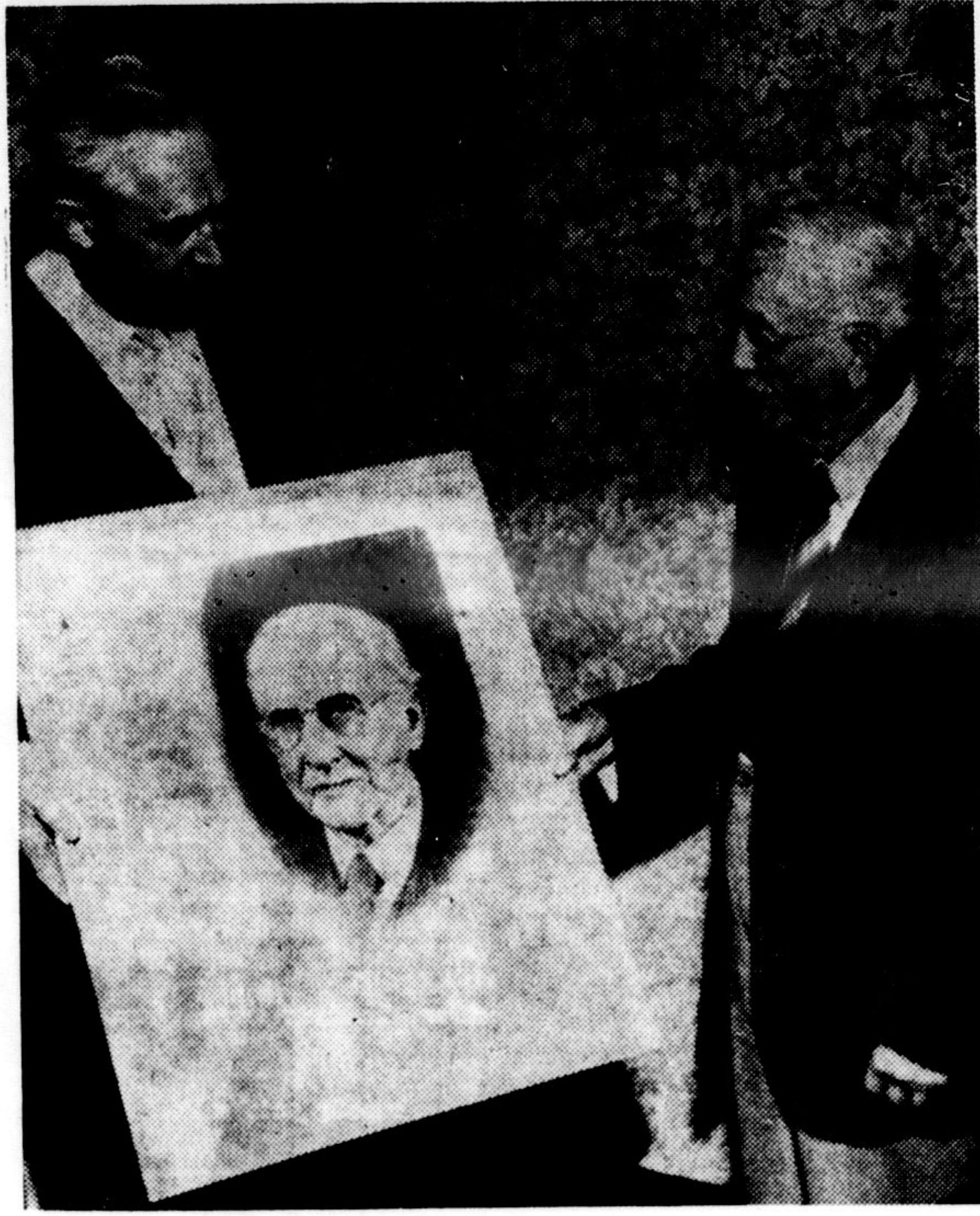
of the year, overcame a 4-1 deficit that existed in the third inning by scoring singles in the fourth and sixth and a brace in the fifth on Saturday. Miller, their righthanded pitching ace, was tagged for nine hits but he kept them well spaced after the third inning. Melanson, Toletzka and Kennedy hit safely twice to pace the Milton attack with Rusk, Gervais and Serafini managing to credit single hits.

For Port Credit, Stan Milne was the big gun smashing out three hits in four official trips and scoring twice himself.

At Port Credit Tuesday the Ports pounded out an 11 hit attack at the expense of Chuck Gervais, who does his hurling from the fork side of the plate. Milton could glean only four hits off F. Milne in the abbreviated seven inning fixture. Milne set them on their ear allowing no more than one hit in any inning. Gervais had a tendency to be wild and he gave up five free passes in addition to hitting the batter once. However, Chuck was the only Milton batter to hit safely twice from Milne. Fay and South shared the other two hits.

Port Credit scored two in the first inning, three in the third and single runs in the fourth and sixth. Milton got a single run in the fifth when Gervais hit safely, stole second and went home on an error to Adachi, the Ports little Japanese catcher. They scored another in the seventh when Grenke walked, stole second and scored on South's drive out of the infield.

Port Credit is the hottest team in the Halton County Intermediate circuit at the moment. They started to be consistent winners at the latter half of the schedule. They evened the account with Milton by winning these two games, Milton being the winning club in the first two meetings.

Team Falls Apart Lose To Oakville

Campbellville threw away the ball game Wednesday, July 9 when they fell apart in the fifth inning and let in four runs on consecutive misplays by Bill Roberts, Dowling and McPhail (2) and a balk by Jack Roberts. Up to that point, Campbellville had been leading 3-1 as they had picked up a run in the first inning on consecutive hits by Dowling and Bill Cairns and two more in the first half of the fifth on a walk, an error by Ken Pollock, a single by Joe Roberts and a passed ball.

The Oaks had scored a single run in the first when Joe Roberts misjudged Gilliams' fly and Withnell singled the latter home. Pollock held the visitors hitless after the fifth, while the Oaks added two more runs in the seventh as a result of a walk, a single by Gilliam and an error by Bill Roberts.

Mark Pollock for the Oaks gave up four hits and struck out eight. Jack Roberts for the losers allowed five hits and struck out nine.
