OBITUARY

Founder of School Dies in Denmark

News of the sudden death on July 7 of John Anchor Madsen, 47, as a result of a heart attack in the railway station in Copenhagen, Denmark, came as a shock to his many friends in the Folk School movement in Ontario. Mr. and Mrs. Madsen had planned a two month tour of their native land and a visit to the Olympic games in Finland. It was the first time they had returned to Denmark since coming to Canada 22 years ago.

John and Betty Madsen founded the Cherry Hill Folk School at Unionville, using the revenue from a sporting goods factory situated on one corner of their farm, to convert the big barn and hen house into gymnasium, working, living and sleeping quarters. For four years the Madsens have seen their dream of a Canadian Folk School come true as people of all races and creeds gathered under one roof in a spirit of fellowship to work, worship, play and live together for a short period and asked nothing in return for this service to their fellow-man except that each one should feel a responsibility toward his community to do his best as needed.

The vacancy left by John Madsen's death will be a challenge to leaders in the Folk School movement to put forth every effort as tirelessly and as effectively as he did himself to help as many people as possible find the secret of abundant living.

Besides his wife, Betty, he leaves to mourn his death, three daughters, Britta, Karen and Anne-Lis.
