**Joint Sewers Now Trafalgar Debate**

Reeve James Wickson of Trafalgar township and Mayor Black of Oakville agreed this week that the township and Oakville should enter jointly into investigation of costs for a joint sewage system to handle all future expansion. Mayor Black attended the meeting of Trafalgar township council on November 24 to give facts and figures on the proposal for Oakville to enter into a contract to handle Trafalgar township sewage.

Reeve James W. Wickson complained that Mayor Black's figures were his own personal figures and were not supported by other members of council and town officials. "Mayor Black has brought a number of figures we didn't ask for," the reeve said.

"When we asked Oakville for a report on the facilities the town could offer us, we didn't ask for a lot of figures," Reeve Wickson said. "We asked what the town could offer us for servicing anywhere from 5,000 to 20,000 people. We wanted to know whether Oakville would handle the situation or whether we would have to build a plant of our own."

"The township presented the town with a detailed plan of a system the township would need in view of our expansion. They gave us a lot of figures but don't say how they arrive at their cost figures."

"Now we hear the province does not like the idea of expanding the Oakville plant to take care of our possible 25,000 expansion. And they give us figures for taking care of 5,000 people without saying how they arrive at their costs."

William G. Storrie, consulting engineer for the township, doubted the Oakville plant was capable of handling an additional load.
